SHARNFORD TRAFFIC ACTION GROUP

Just as we thought we could take a breather and take a step back from the traffic issue, an article appeared in the Hinckley Times. It was written by Sam Dimmer - who incidentally wrote *that* article about the road causing a cancer scare in the village. This recent article said that the Sharnford Bypass had been axed. The journalist based the article after the East Midlands Assembly reported their spending for 2009 - 2014 and Sharnford was not mentioned. This also triggered an article in 'Contract Journal' as many contractors were counting on a bypass being built around Sharnford for jobs and revenue.

So, is it true? We have not to date had this confirmed directly from Leicestershire County Council or the Highways Agency. Both STAG and the Parish Council will be finding out what the situation is. LCC has already spent a considerable amount on the surveys for the project, but we need to know what their intended timescale is.

STAG and the Parish Council have been contacted by LCC to attend a meeting to discuss the outcome of their Lorry Movement Plan for Sharnford, which was one of the short term options to relieve the lorry situation through the village. We will pass on any information we receive in the next Sharnford News. Details may also be available on our minutes, posted on the Noticeboards around the village.

Two planning applications have also come to light in the last month. Details are as follows:

1. Bio Digester - Old Fosse Way Bridge.

This is to convert a farm into a Bio-Digester Plant. This uses waste food and dairy products from companies such as Tesco, Sainsbury's and Arla etc. It biodegrades them to produce energy and fertilizers. An excellent project, but sadly it will mean approx 10,000 extra lorry movements passing through this area.

2. Powners, Manor Farm, Aston Flamville Lane.

An application has been made to expand the business from its current composting to include plastic re-cycling. Once again an admirable project, but means even more lorry movements passing through Sharnford and Aston Flamville.

STAG have lodged a formal objection based on the traffic issues both applications will place on Sharnford. Leicestershire County Council have already agreed that the traffic situation in Sharnford is unacceptable. To put extra lorries through the village without having a bypass in place would be intolerable.

Speedwatch is back! You may have seen the monitoring taking place in surrounding villages such as Sapcote, Stoney Stanton - even Hinckley has been at it! Although we realise LCC have agreed there is a traffic problem in the village, we felt it was a good idea to continue with the scheme, as the official figures have been, and will continue to be

STAG will be hiring a pollution monitor - similar to the ones seen at the Beijing Olympics. We hope to monitor pollution for a 2 week period in September. We feel this is the final piece to the jigsaw. We have never been allowed access to the results of the LCC and Blaby monitoring

that has been carried out over the past 3 years.

It seems STAG will be busy over the next few months. We will report any information we receive as soon as possible.

Finally we would like to thank the Parish Council for dedicating the Jubilee Cup at the village fete to STAG. Your cheers were much appreciated. Also a big thank you to everyone who came to our Hoopla stall, for all your support and good wishes.

SHARNFORD ENVIRONMENT GROUP

Firstly, a few words of grateful appreciation for the support and input we had from Mike Thomas. As many of you will know, he died on August 1st. Our thoughts and condolences are sent to his wife Anne and family. Mike's care and knowledge of wildlife proved the measure of the man. He supported the Group by giving practical help and advice, particularly along with Veronica Smyth when bird boxes were installed in gardens of the village. He led the Group on several walks around Fosse Meadows, and we learned much that is not obvious to the general public. We will not forget him or his dedication to the natural world, including his favourite, the wild birds.

Many of you will have noticed that the two culverts adjacent to the footpath on Poors Meadow have disappeared! The work was done by Leics. County Council. The final surface will be grassed over but some sinkage is inevitable and therefore needs a little time before being finished. The Group now has to find funding for the planned curved path between the roadside gate and the existing footpath, together with two seating benches. We are still in discussion on this project, as it may be more practical to combine the grant application with that for the proposed village sign, which could be incorporated in this work. So watch this space..............

Other activity planned for this Autumn is to move the planters on the Aston Lane (they are being replaced with two from the Coventry Road). They will then be re-modelled and installed by the road crossing. Whilst this may not seem a major task, those boxes are very heavy even when empty. The contents will have to be removed prior to the re-modelling work and refreshed when the re-siting is complete.

We have been asked by the Parish Council to install a hard surface for the bus stop on Aston Lane. The necessary materials have been acquired and we plan to complete this task well before the winter.

We plan to install a bird feeding station on Blue Bell Green, probably close to the 'sleeper' flower beds. Another task to be completed before the winter. Norman Burrows has volunteered to carry out the maintenance of the station.

As you can see there is a lot going on. Please keep in mind the Open Gardens Weekend, planned for late June 2010. If you haven't signed up yet, contact any member of the Group to express your interest. It could spur you on to a best-ever colourful display!

Finally, the group is in need of more members; perhaps you would like to join us? The only 'qualification' needed is to be a village resident. The members tend to be divided into three groups (1) those who attend meetings regularly and help out with practical tasks and projects, (2) those who attend meetings regularly and are regarded as a 'village voice' but are unable to give practical help (for varying reasons) and lastly (3) some members who seldom attend meetings but are able (and prefer) to help out with ongoing projects. Do any of these options sound like you? If you think you are able to support us please come to a meeting, if only to express an interest. We meet on the second Thursday of each month, 7.30pm in the Evergreen Hall. The next meeting date is September 10th, then October 8th etc etc.

RIDE AND STRIDE

Each year we announce the date of this event but do you know what Ride and Stride is all about? For those who don't, let me explain.

The Historic Churches Trust of Leicestershire seeks to keep all the county's churches in good order and needs to raise funds for this task. It arranges for all Anglican churches to be open and manned from 10am to 4pm on a given date and invites people to cycle (or walk) to as many churches as possible, first seeking sponsors who will donate a given sum for every church they visit. In addition to an entrance form, participants are given a record card to be signed by an official at every church visited. When their sponsorship money is handed over, half will go to the Trust and half to their 'home' church. This year's ride is on 12th September.

This morning I met a man visiting the churchyard, who asked about the church fire (which gutted the east end of St. Helens in 1985). He also asked if it was true that it was lovingly restored by the efforts of the village and I proudly confirmed that it was. No one not even people who had never set foot in the church - wanted to see it derelict and unused, because it was seen as the focal point of the village, so they pitched in to raise funds for repairs.

Now, 24 years later, St. Helens is once again in need of tender loving care (and a toilet!) and by taking part in the Ride and Stride you could help your church - not to mention the fact that you will be doing yourself a favour by getting some (probably needed) exercise! There are many churches (and the odd chapel that will open) that you could visit around here. How about Sharnford to Sapcote, on to Stoney Stanton and Broughton Astley before returning to home base via Frolesworth? If you feel you could take part, forms and record

He wrote each quarterly report with a careful eye to the detail of the season under review, overlaid with many tales of the unexpected, particularly among his favoured species, the birds. His description constantly shouted "come and see, it's a wonderful display" and those who read and followed his advice were not disappointed.

Although we are slow to acknowledge it, we are so lucky to have Fosse Meadows on our doorstep, and we have been more than fortunate to have had Mike among us to voice the picture that continues to evolve there every day. We know that many of you looked forward to the contributions he provided to Sharnford News.

Sadly, too quickly, too early, there will be no more.

THE COUNTRYMAN SICK AND DIVIDEND BENEVOLENT FUND

IMPORTANT NOTICE

At the A.G.M. on 29 March several members of the committee expressed their wish to stand down. However, because there were no members of the general public present at the meeting there was therefore no one to join the society and sit on the committee. Given these circumstances the committee decided to continue the society's activities until the New Year (including the distribution of the Christmas Gifts and support of the School's Christmas party in 2009) and, unless a replacement committee had been formed, proposed that the society would then be disbanded.

I believe that the 'Sick and Divi' was formed in the 1930s and its primary function at

that time, as the name implies, was to provide financial support to its members should they fall ill. I can recall paying 1/6d per week myself in the late fifties to secure a dividend of 10/- if I was 'on the sick'. Today the welfare state or private insurance covers this eventuality and the actual 'sick and divi' aspect of the society has not been carried out for many years.

Similarly, the committee now feel that, although the tradition of distribution of Christmas gifts has in the past been a worthwhile cause, there is not the same need today for this type of charitable gift. Although each year messages of thanks
