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#### SHARNFORD PARISH COUNCIL

Major progress has been made by the Parish Council in recent months and the next few weeks should see much of it reaching fruition.

December 2<sup>nd</sup> will see a production of Beauty & the Beast performed in the Evergreen Hall by a touring group of professional actors sponsored by The Arts Council and supported by funds from Leicestershire County and Blaby District Councils. The show is fully sold out and thanks are due to all who have brought this opportunity to see professional live theatre into the heart of the village.

Also in December, subject to weather conditions, we can expect to see the next significant step forward in the development of the new burial ground in Mill Lane. All being well, the road at the entrance will be re-surfaced, the car park area and internal footpaths will be laid and the entrance gates will be fitted. Contracts have been placed and the work is due to begin immediately. We have been greatly assisted in this move by the kind offer by farmer Ian Fulford to fund the drainage work needed to keep the area from flooding. Tony Curtis's tree planting and ground levelling activities have continued apace so that by early Spring we shall have an area to be proud of. The provision of a shelter and the widening of a section of Mill Lane are next on the agenda and should be undertaken during 2010.

Progress towards improving the Youth Club facilities continues to be slow but efforts are undiminished either from the Parish Council or the Youth Club committee. Negotiations with Blaby D.C. are ongoing in an effort to persuade them to transfer ownership of the premises to the village in order that applications for grants can be initiated.

Naturally the Parish Council continues to oversee the general well-being of the village. Attention has been drawn to a number of road drains which are blocked, the bus shelter has been re-roofed, we are seeking to have the brook cleared and we have a subcommittee examining how to effect a make-over of the children's play area in Park View. There are some concerns about a number of privately owned hedges around the village that are encroaching on to footpaths and hindering people's progress. If you have such a hedge, **PLEASE** ensure it is cut back to the edge of your property.

Finally, many congratulations, and thanks, to Mike Bishop on his being given an Outstanding Achievement Award for Selfless Service to the Community – well deserved!! *Derek Gibbons, Sharnford Parish Council*

#### ST HELEN'S CHURCH

Our first event of the autumn season was the 'Ride and Stride' in September. The sum of £222 was raised and then equally divided between the Leicestershire Historic Churches Trust and St. Helen's Church. The next event, the Harvest Festival, was well attended and the gifts of preservable food were once again donated to the Hinckley homeless and the Wykin project. The collection on that day plus other gifts of money (totalling £200 plus) went to Tearfund. Later that same day, October 4th,

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Karen and Sophia, two members of our congregation, were confirmed at St. Mary's Church, Hinckley and at our family service on the 1st of November, Rev. Norman presented each of them with a gift of the New Testament written in a modern form.

On the 8th November a service of remembrance was held at the war memorial, where 30 people (at least) participated in the short service and observed the two minutes' silence.

During this last quarter funerals have been conducted for Roger John Neal, Ken Withers and Bernard Roughton. We also heard of the death of John Beale and were able to view and admire his beautiful floral tributes when they found their way into our churchyard. We extend our deepest sympathies to all who have been touched by the loss of these loved ones.

We are coming up to the Christmas season; the dates of our services and celebrations have now been announced: On the 13<sup>th</sup> December the Explorers' Christmas party will commence at 9.15am and the Carol Service will begin at 6.30pm. On the 20<sup>th</sup> December the Christingle and Nativity service will begin at 9.15am. On the 24<sup>th</sup> December the Midnight Communion service will begin at 11.15pm. On the 25<sup>th</sup> December Family Holy Communion will be held at 9.15 am.

As you may be aware the big project for the church is to provide a toilet within its walls and we have already received generous gifts for this project (again our grateful thanks to all who have donated) the most recent being the sum of £50 raised on the coach holiday organised by Margaret Hubbard. The holiday makers were 'fined' 10p each time they said



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the words 'bus' or 'driver' and, bless them, they all paid up faithfully if they did so. Thank you friends, we really do appreciate your gift and the spirit in which it was raised. With such goodwill the toilet may well be a reality sooner than we dared to hope.

#### SHARNFORD ENVIRONMENT GROUP



The last three months have been busy for the group so here's what we have been up to:

Poors Meadow: We are delighted to report that the two senior classes of the village school joined us for a bulb planting session, late last month (see photo). A large variety of bulbs were planted, mostly of the woodland type. These bulbs were donated by the parents, so our appreciation goes to the families who donated, but especially to the children, who did an excellent job. So look out for a more colourful patch next Spring on Poors Meadow. On this same site, we have now met up with the Environment Agency relating to tree planting and the proposed new path. The tree planting (10 Field Maple) will take place in early December and is close to where the new bulbs are. In the same vicinity will be the new

path, this will be curved running from the road gate to the existing tarmac path and will be flush with the grass height. This is in accordance with the Environment Agency guidelines, but also makes for easier mowing! We are now in discussion with various organisations in order to raise the necessary money. The village sign will be a separate project, as the group agreed that it would be more manageable this way.

<u>Planters:</u> You will have noticed that the two planters by the village sign on the Coventry Road, have now been re-sited. We had hoped to put them either side of the sign on the Aston lane, but this was not possible due to a large manhole cover (probably needed for the nearby works) on the grass verge. We now have two 'spare' planters that will be redesigned to make a more attractive triple set for siting by the pedestrian crossing. After replacing with new plants in the existing planters, we have found some rotten wood work that needs renewing, hence the delay in completing the planting. Our thanks to Terry Clark for his assistance with the moving of those very heavy items.

<u>Bus Stop Aston Lane:</u> Regretfully we are not able to undertake this task (although we were willing!). After further investigation by the Parish Council, they were advised by Leicestershire County Council, Highways section that should a paved area be required, the LCC would have to do the work, and the Parish Council pay for it.

Over the winter months, we shall continue to care for BlueBell Green with bird feeding and a little weeding. We must look to the Spring for moneys for next years hanging baskets, plus Poors Meadow. There is always something happening and to plan for. It is a busy time for us all as Christmas approaches. The group sincerely hope that it is a peaceful and happy time for everyone so ENJOY!

#### SHARNFORD PRIMARY SCHOOL

Sharnford Primary School has welcomed 13 new children to the school during the Autumn term, our total now is 55.

During September a group of year 3 and 4 children from Sharnford and All Saints Primary School spent 3 days, 2 nights at Beaumanor Hall, Leicestershire. Some of the



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activities that the children took part in were canoeing, archery, climbing and survival skills. The weather was good and the children behaved very well and had a good time.

Parents were invited to a 'Meet the teacher' session during September where the class teacher was able to explain the weekly routine, homework arrangements, expectations, the curriculum and the targets for the term. Parents evening will take place at the beginning of December.

There is a number of clubs taking place this term. Monday is French club for children in years 2 to 6, Bollywood Dance takes place on a Tuesday for children in years 3 to 6, Wednesday is multi skills sports club for children in Reception to year 4 and on a Thursday children in years 3 to 6 have the opportunity to join Choir club.

The school nurse visited school and talked to the children in years 5 and 6 about personal hygiene and carried out a hand washing session with children in reception, year one and two.

Harvest assembly took place on Friday 16th October and this was led by Class two. A collection took place for Tearfund and £56.09 was raised. To enhance the children's learning in geography the children in reception, year one and year two enjoyed a walk around the village.

Following a successful bid, children in years 5 and 6 travelled to All Saints Primary School to join their peers and had the opportunity to experience the BAE Systems Roadshow and a Royal Air Force in-school event. Year 6 children took part in a workshop in which they programmed a Lego mindstorm robot around a track.

Parents kindly donated bulbs to the school following a letter on behalf of the school council and these have been planted in Poors Meadow.

The PTA have organised a Christmas Disco and Christmas workshop for the children and continue to raise much needed money for school.

Thank you to everyone for sending in vouchers. We have received 8 PE CD's and new hoola hoops from the Sainsbury voucher scheme and a nest box, bird table, insect habitat, ladybird house, frog and toad house, hop sacks and mark making tools from the Tesco Scheme.

The children and staff are now busy rehearing for their Christmas production which they will be performing on Tuesday 8th and 15th December.

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#### SHARNFORD TRAFFIC ACTION GROUP

As I predicted in my last article STAG have been kept rather busy over the last few months so I would firstly like to say thanks to all the volunteers for their efforts.

Speedwatch was carried out at the beginning of September. We were hampered by some rainy days but persevered and managed to clock up 12 hours of monitoring. Generally things do seem to have improved since our last Speedwatch programme in 2007. We only record vehicles travelling at +34mph. The results were as follows;

- 198 vehicles exceeding 34mph
- Aston Lane average of speeding vehicles 37.8mph. Highest recorded speed 44mph

- Leicester Road/ Coventry Road average of speeding vehicles 38.7mph. Highest recorded speed 54mph

The application for the Bio-digester plant at Old Fosse Way Bridge was objected to by Sapcote, Stoney Stanton, Sharnford and Broughton Astley, based on the road infrastructure being unable cope with the volume of heavy vehicles the scheme would bring to the area. To date we are unaware of a further application being made.

STAG carried out its Pollution Monitoring at the end of September/ beginning of October. We are paying for a professional to assess and analyse the data. By the next newsletter we will be able to give you an idea of the findings. As a group we decided that the results, if controversial, will not be made available to the media, as we have to think of the impact on the village with regards to people selling houses etc. The results will only be used as a negotiating tool with the authorities.

STAG members attended the recent Parish Council Meeting, along with Ian Veers and David East from Highways. They were putting forward the results of a lorry management scheme that was being considered for Sharnford. It was based on a similar scheme in Dorset. It involved signs that would stop vehicles if a heavy goods vehicle was coming the opposite way on the narrow section of Leicester Road. When two HGV's pass on that section, one HGV will generally have to mount the pavement to avoid clipping each other.

Their results found that the system would not work for Sharnford due to the volume of traffic passing through! We could have a situation where over 25 vehicles would be standing stationary for a period of time. This would in turn create a noise and pollution problem.

STAG and the Parish Council are in agreement that any scheme needs to keep traffic moving through the village. We again put forward the implementation of a 20mph limit in

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the village. This would slow the vehicles down but keep them moving. Also, a vehicle travelling at 20mph will create less pollution than one travelling at +30mph.

The meeting also gave us a chance to ask what Leicestershire County Council and Highways official statement on the Sharnford Bypass is. Disappointingly, due to lack of funding, the bypass is now to be considered in the 2014 - 2019 budget, unless funding can be found from elsewhere. It is also now part of a larger South West Leicestershire sustainable traffic scheme, which deals with the traffic problems for Narborough, Enderby, Lutterworth and Hinckley.

This means that STAG have to keep pushing for short term options to help the village until a bypass can be funded. Highways assured us that the village is being monitored on a regular basis with regards to volume of traffic and speed of vehicles. We again asked about an improved road surface to reduce the noise of heavy vehicles passing through. That is being considered for next year's budget from April 2010.

The year has been one of progress, hard work to gain evidence and information and the frustration of the time it takes to get results. STAG *have* to be in this for the long term and 2010 will bring continued efforts from all our members to seek the solutions that this village needs.

Thank you to the Parish Council and to all residents of Sharnford for your support. We wish you all a Happy Christmas and a Prosperous New Year.

#### GUIDE DOG PUPPIES IN SHARNFORD

For five consecutive Thursday afternoons in August and September a group of puppy walkers from the surrounding area, together with their puppies, began a successful training programme at the Evergreen Hall .

Ten puppies took part, aged between four and ten months: 3 Golden Retrievers – Benny, Laska and Vespa; 6 Labradors – Belvoir (pronounced Beaver), Freda, Gus, Reggie, Sam and Vance, and my puppy Nadia, a curly coat Retriever cross Labrador.

In the guide dog world, each litter of puppies is named after the same letter of the alphabet and Nadia has five sisters and three brothers all with names beginning with N. During the course of a year over 1000 puppies are named in this way – only the letter X is omitted.

Emma, our puppy walking Supervisor was there each week to put us through our paces. We had a talk from Karen, the Guide Dog Welfare Officer, who stressed the importance of diet and briefed us on the health problems which can occur in overweight dogs. Terry Smith, a Guide Dog Puppy Walking Manager, paid us a visit and was impressed by the facilities offered in the village.



The object of puppy classes is to teach best practice in their care and to begin learning the skills a puppy will need to become a working dog. We practice sit and wait, down and stay, walking at different speeds and recall. Puppies are taught to weave through cones (guide dogs have many obstacles to negotiate during their working lives). They learn to walk over low obstacles, to teach concentration on where they put their feet

and to sit and wait before passing through gates and doors.

Distraction training is very important. Each puppy is assessed on how quickly they recover their level of concentration when being distracted by other dogs, people and objects and how quickly the puppy responds to stimulus to regain their attention, using voice commands, treats or toys.

Sometimes nothing goes to plan and pups can be very naughty but it is great fun and very enjoyable. At the end of each session the puppies are allowed to socialize and we have a good natter over welcome refreshments! More training sessions are booked for 2010, beginning on  $7^{th}$  January.

Guide dogs have been giving freedom and independence to the visually impaired for over 50 years. They are provided by The Guide Dogs for the Blind Association, a registered charity run entirely on voluntary donations. The working life of a dog is about six and a half years and many owners have several dogs during their lifetime.

The cost to breed, train and care for each dog is about £10 per day. The Charity employs 900 professional people in the UK and is supported by 10,000 volunteers, including puppy walkers, breeding stock holders, dog boarders and thousands of local fundraisers.
