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SHARNFORD PARISH COUNCIL

There is an ancient far-eastern curse which goes "May you live in interesting times!". We can only assume that someone has issued that curse against the Parish Council, for the past few months have certainly given us some interesting times.

Not all of them bad, it must be said.

First, a very successful promotion of Beauty & the Beast was achieved in December when the Arts Council sponsored group from the Fairgame Theatre, Cheltenham performed in the Evergreen Hall. The hall was full to capacity and everyone – including the actors – had a thoroughly enjoyable evening. Thanks to the Arts Council and funding from Leicestershire and Blaby Councils all costs were met so the event was mounted with no cost to the Parish Council. We will be looking to present a similar event this year.



Second, the development of the new Burial ground progresses and with any good fortune, by the time this edition of Sharnford News is being read, the car park will have been completed. That good fortune really is needed though, since the intervention of the weather has seriously delayed both the start and the progress of the work. The snow and the rain made conditions quite impossible for the heavy equipment to get onto the ground and also highlighted deficiencies in the drainage plans. However, both

have been overcome through a lot of hard work on behalf of the contractor and, once again, the goodwill of farmer Ian Fulford.

And third in our collection of major involvements is the story of the ANAEROBIC DIGESTER!! Just as we thought the work of STAG and the Parish Council had made a successful impression on County Highways officers and extracted an agreement that a bypass was needed – even if lack of funding was likely to delay it until 2014 – we were hit by the threat of up to 20,000 more vehicles a year being routed through our village. At the time of writing it is still not clear when a decision will be taken regarding this planning application but be assured that we shall be there!! The Public Meeting held in Broughton Astley on 3rd February was most encouraging. More than 200 people attended from all of the surrounding villages and a fair estimate is that nearly half were from Sharnford. Strong presentations were made to the County Councillors and planning officers as to why this

development should not be approved in this location. The appeal for as many people as possible to write letters of protest to the planners has clearly borne fruit for it is clear that many village residents have done so. Many have sent copies of their letter to me and I really am pleased to see them but I hope you will understand that I cannot acknowledge them all individually so hope you will accept this report as your acknowledgement, but a huge thank you for all the support that has been forthcoming.

Work has continued on preparing a case to persuade Blaby District Council to





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
transfer ownership of the Youth Club and the children's play area to the Parish Council and it is highly probable that the next edition of Sharnford News will carry a report that all is in hand to start a proper refurbishment of that corner of Park View Recreation Ground, including a new Youth & Community Centre – BUT WATCH THIS SPACE!!

Poors Meadow - Great News! We have been successful with our grant applications and we now have the money to start the work in this area; we are just waiting for the weather to improve. Some of the bulbs planted by the schoolchildren are just 'peeping through' - a sure sign Spring isn't so far away. In December we planted 10 Field Maple trees along the line of the new footpath, due to be installed in March. (see photo)

Hanging Baskets and Planters - Another success story. Voluntary Action Leicestershire has given us an award from their Grassroots Fund. This money will enable us to provide all the necessary plants, materials and maintenance sundries for 2010. It will be nice to be able to plan the activity against a known budget.

CONTAMINATION OF THE SOARBROOK

Over a number of years there has been sporadic leakage of domestic central heating oil into the Soarbrook. The source has been traced to a storm drain which enters the brook on the Park. According to the Environment Agency, the line of this drain is almost certainly a pipe which was laid in a ditch when Park View was constructed.

The frequency of the leakage suggests that oil is flowing into the pipe when a tank is filled above the level of a leak point in the tank or the delivery piping. **Are you feeding expensive oil into the brook?** It is also possible that a disused tank with oil remaining in it is leaking on occasions, for a variety of reasons.

So, **if you live in Park View or the bottom end of Henson Way** and you use oil heating or have a disused tank on your property, would you please thoroughly check the installation. The Environment Agency's guidelines on prevention of pollution at oil installations (their leaflet PPG2) is available on request at 08708 506 506.

Please do check, even if you need to wait until it is warmer!

AWARDS OF EXCELLENCE WINNER MASTER PHOTOGRAPHY AWARDS 2009

Sharnford, Leicestershire based photographer Ian Pickering has achieved an Award of Excellence in a major national professional photography competition.

Ian was placed in the Commercial Photography category in the Master Photography Awards 2009. Ian beat off competition from other leading professional photographers from across Britain, winning him the title of 'UK Commercial Photographer of the year 2009'. Not only that, he came second overall Nation-wide after winning fist place for the Midlands, in the Wedding Photography Category.

Hundreds of professional photographers from around the world were joined by representatives from the major photographic companies at a glittering Awards ceremony held on 11th October at the Hilton Hotel in Newcastle.

The Awards, run by the Master Photographers Association (MPA), is one of the most prestigious within the photographic profession. Membership of the Association is restricted to full time professional photographers who must qualify to the minimum required Licentiateship standard. The organisation exists to promote and maintain standards of excellence and professionalism within the photographic industry.

MPA Chief Executive, Colin Buck was delighted with this year's entries and paid tribute to Ian's success: "There was a great diversity of imagery, and all were judged on the same criteria: artistic merit, good use of lighting, composition and print quality - all the winners were of a very high overall standard. Winning a Master Photography Award is a huge honour for any photographer and I'm delighted for Ian. I'm sure this award will help Ian to further his career."

Ian, who runs his photographic business from his studio based in Sharnford, is said to be delighted with his recent success "I still can't quite believe it. To be recognized by all my peers is just great. My business is going from strength to strength, and all the hard work is now starting to pay off, hopefully this award will help me gain some new business, which is very exciting".

Ian has been chosen as one of the countries top 5 photographers, to feature in an TV program, "A Day in the life of a professional photographer", of which he was filmed for last week, on location at one of his clients, Quartzelec, in Rugby, and then back in the

Bird Song

Early spring is a great time to hear birds singing, and it is often easier to see them without the leaves on the trees. Join the Watermead Rangers on Sunday 16th. May for a Dawn Chorus Walk and learn how to identify bird songs. (Watermead Country Park is off Wanlip Road, near Syston, LE7 1PD. Tel: 0116 305 5434).

Squirrel Dreys

Whilst trees are bare of leaves, it's easier to spot squirrel nests, called dreys. About the size of a football, they are much bigger and messier than birds` nests, and they have a roof!

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Woodpeckers

On a warm day, take a walk through woodland with plenty of large, old trees, and listen for woodpeckers drumming against hollow, dead or dying trees. It's the males who make the noise in order to defend their territory and attract a mate. They drum their beak into the wood at about 40 pecks a second!

Hedgehogs

The number of hedgehogs in Britain is declining due to loss of habitat and lack of food. Why not make your garden more hedgehog-friendly by: not using slug pellets, as these can kill a healthy hedgehog; make a compost heap where hedgehogs can find food; put out a shallow bowl of fresh clean drinking water.

Things to look out for in the coming months:

March:

The male Goat Willow flower- heads with Golden Anthers come out this month. **See photo**.

The Brimstone butterfly comes out of hibernation in late February to early March.

In sheltered places the Lesser Periwinkle starts to flower.

`Mad March` Hares can be



seen chasing one another around meadows and farm fields. Look out for the females boxing the males to test their determination.

April:

Snails start to wake from hibernation.

The Primrose flowers now. The Latin name means `First Rose`.

Cowslips flower. In the Middle Ages ointment was made from the petals and used to cure spots.

Frogs lay their eggs in the water—often 5,000 are laid at once. After about 3 weeks the tiny tadpoles hatch out.

Orange Tip Butterflies can be seen; males have bright orange tips of the front wings.

May:

Flowering Bluebells create beautiful carpets of colour in woods.

Over-wintering Brimstone butterflies emerge and lay their eggs on Buckthorn and Alder Blackthorn, the plant food for their green caterpillars. **See photo**

The Common Blue butterfly emerge. They lay their eggs on Birdsfoot Trefoil.

COMMUNITY GROUPS GET CHRISTMAS CASH BOOST

Christmas came early for community groups across Blaby last week as more than £30,000 in funding was handed out from the district council.

The grants, ranging from £200 - £5,000 were given to 20 different organisations in total, with sports clubs, environment groups and community coffee bars all getting a cash boost.



Narborough and Littlethorpe Football Club received £5,000 which will help them replace their rundown changing room and put in extra facilities to accommodate all the teams that use the ground on match days.

Sharnford Environment Group collected a cheque for £950, towards the planned improvements to Poors Meadow. See photo on left.

Several new projects were also given funding including C@fe Latte, a community coffee bar based in Croft, and Mum's Teapot Stop, a mother and toddler group which is being set up in Enderby.

Cheques were given to representatives of each organisation by Councillor Alan Bailey, chairman of the council, he said: "These grants allow local groups to continue their excellent work. There are so many people doing amazing things throughout Blaby district so it's great that they're being supported."

The grants, which are given to not-for-profit community groups that want to expand or develop their services are funded by Blaby District Council and allocated by Voluntary Action Blaby District (VABD) on their behalf.

So far this year nearly £60,000 has been awarded to community groups and there is still money left to be allocated in the final quarter of this year. Anyone wanting to apply for a community grant should contact VABD on 0116 272 7669.

Blaby is the second best place to live outside the south of England according to a new report. Places in the south of the country made up 28 of the top 30 local authority areas offering the best quality of life, according to a Halifax survey. Blaby was ranked number 23 in the list, beating Kensington and Chelsea (24), Richmond upon Thames (25) and Windsor (49). Only Rutland (20) scored higher in the whole of the East Midlands.

The study of 408 local authority areas measured criteria such as average weekly earnings, employment rates, number of burglaries, carbon emissions and life expectancy. Blaby's employment rate was ranked joint third in the country at 85.7% and the district also had the nation's second highest owner-occupation rate at 87%.

Ernie White, Leader of Blaby District Council said: "I have known that Blaby is a fantastic place to live and work for many years and this report just confirms that. The council has always offered great support to its residents - especially through the recession - and now we are seeing the rewards."
