SHARNFORD PARISH COUNCIL

It's been an interesting time on the Parish Council recently! After much confusion it transpired that the current council's term was not complete – there is another year to do. As myself and Derek Gibbons had been working towards it ending our term this year we both took the decision to resign. I would like to thank Derek for his enormous commitment to the Parish Council, steering it through some challenging projects such as the Burial Ground and the Youth Club.

As we approached this Sharnford News issue, the remaining quorum of 5 councillors had yet to meet and elect their new Chairman. It is customary that the Chairman's report to the AGM is normally printed in the June, but as it is yet to be put to the council they have given me permission to include a few extracts from it.

'The Youth Club lease has finally been finalised. The Youth Club/Community Hall, although in it's infancy as a project flourished during the past year, through the hard work and innovation of the Youth Club Committee. I feel that it is in good hands and I am personally hopeful for its future as a great asset to Sharnford.

The Burial Ground once again is still a project in its infancy. Lessons are being learnt, but attention needs to be given to the running and administration. As the Burial Ground becomes more widely used a role will need to be created for a caretaker. This is something that needs to be built in to future budgets.

Following complaints from residents with regards to the village crossing and parking issues outside the Sharnford Arms, the Parish Council and STAG entered into negotiations with Highways. Highways were extremely helpful with both issues and we now have improved lights on the crossing. The road outside the Sharnford Arms now has visible road markings and a central refuge.

The reports from The Environment Agency with regards to air pollution were disappointing, but were no great surprise. The results were taken in two separate locations in the south part of the village. 12 months more of tests are being undertaken and if pollution levels remain at the current levels, the Authorities will have to look at ways of reducing pollution levels. The Parish Council must ensure that the results are chased up and that the Authorities act accordingly, if the results once again prove to be an issue to health in the village.

Flooding is another issue that must continue to be monitored. The Parish Council have pressed the Environment Agency on a number of occasions during the past year, to remove silt from the Soar Brook in the centre of the village. As yet we still have not had a positive response. However an exercise to remove heavy weed from the brook adjacent to the meadows was requested by the Parish Council and has been completed. The PC conducted a number of meetings with Leicestershire County Council officers to

develop an action plan to divert traffic away from Sharnford on occasions of the centre of the village flooding. We are still awaiting a final response from the officers. As much help must be given to residents who live with the threat of flooding. The Parish Council must continue to ensure that the Council is clearing drains and waterways on a regular basis.

The Parish Council have successfully liaised with Blaby Environmental Health and Planning Officers to carry out sound level testing related to Hovercraft

operations at the Shades. This resulted in a temporary Planning Approval for continued hovercraft operation but with stringent noise level control criteria, to ensure nuisance avoidance for local residents. Monitoring of continued compliance is ongoing.

The proposal for a development of Affordable Housing at the north end of the village received funding and planning approval. This will hopefully allow appropriate local residents to continue to live in the village. The development will also improve the visual approach to the village from the north.

I have offered my services to the Parish Council as a voluntary 'Road Safety Liaison Officer' reporting to the Parish Council. If they agree, then I hope to continue to use the relationships I have built with Highways, to improve safety on the B4114 through the village.'

I wish the continuing Parish Council well for the future.

A sports coach comes in to school each week to run an afterschool multi sports club and football club. Parents evening was very well attended and parents were asked to complete a questionnaire to offer their views of the school. Food Support offered a special Easter meal and the opportunity of entering Junior Chef of the year competition. WHAT'S THIS DAVE - ON THE BRIC-A-BRAC STALL?

Down at the Evergreen Fair Trade Bacon Buttie Morning the other week, Margaret Hubbard asked me this question "What's this brass thing I picked up from the Bric-a-



Brac table?" "I've no idea - looks like a timepiece device" I said. Margaret, thinking she had discovered something really interesting said "It looks a bit antique, I wonder if it's worth anything?" "I'm not sure" I said "but if you don't want it I'll have it!" With that, off she went, bought it for 50p and gave it to me...."there" she said "see if you can find out what it is?".......so I did!!

Here is the object as found, after twisting the centre ring a little.

After only a few minutes search on the internet with Google and BINGO! – I knew what it was....it

is called a **Two-Ring Universal Equinoctial Ring Dial.** The bad news however was, our piece is missing some important parts. Here is what it should look like.



A two-ring universal equinoctial ring dial - was a cutting edge scientific instrument in its time, which is about 500 years ago! Essentially it is a type of sundial that allows you to tell the time wherever you are, so long as the sun is shining.

Originally developed in the early 17th century by the English mathematician William Oughtred, it was a development of an earlier instrument, the astronomer's ring, which was used for measuring the

altitude of stars and also terrestrial objects.

You need to know your latitude, so this is the first adjustment that you need to make. Secondly you need to set the date using the sliding section in the middle. Then you rotate the inner ring until it won't turn any more, and your ring dial will now look like the picture below.

Suspend the ring dial by the cord, such that the sun shines through the pinhole in the middle, and hits the centre of the inner ring. From here you can read off the time. When you have finished, you can fold the ring dial flat again.

The ring dial does not allow for the 1 hour change in summer time, so you need to factor that in to your calculations. It can work in any latitude from 20 degrees to 75 degrees, in either hemisphere.

What is clever is that, unlike a normal sundial that needs to be aligned and requires you to know the exact direction of north, the ring dial does not need this information. Needs no batteries!

So the last question to discover was 'what is it worth?' Could this be a 17th century lost treasure and if it was – where are the missing pieces? Maybe the stall holder could tell us where it came from...but wait a minute, what does this label on the back say? 'Made in Korea'...can't be!! Yes it was and Google confirmed you can buy this replica Ring Dial on EBay for about \$30 (£25) – sorry Margaret "don't book that

This modern replica is made of solid brass, and comes in a small cardboard presentation box, together with instructions. The dial is 6cm across.

The Council will be holding its AGM on the 27th May, and BDC is ambitious for the people living, working and visiting our district. Over the past year we have seen what can be achieved through working, with and supporting Leicestershire Families programme. We have seen the benefits of developing stronger relationships with local businesses and the success with the introductions of our weekly recycling service.

BDC has achieved so much during this past year and I would like to highlight just a few.

- Planning consent for Lubbesthorpe will deliver homes and jobs for people in a sustainable way.
- Issued outline planning consent for the Everards micro brewery development again bringing jobs and leisure opportunities to the area.
- Ongoing work to return empty homes back into use.
- Obtained £100,000 to deliver a property flood protection scheme for Sharnford.
- Completed management plans for the Council's key countryside sites. Improvements made at Fosse Meadows to the car parks and the installation of a fantastic new Bird Hide.
- The Volunteer Ranger Scheme now have 16 new volunteer Rangers taking our total to 27.
- Completed the Rural Exception sites at Elmesthorpe and Thurlaston resulting in 12 new affordable homes especially for local people.
- Worked in partnership with LCC, East Midlands Housing Group and Westleigh Homes to deliver a new flagship Extra Care scheme at Winchester Road in Blaby.
- Police and Crime Commissioner has agreed the formal merger of Blaby and Hinckley & Bosworth Community Safety Partnership.
- Approved over 90 Disabled Facilities Grants, enabling disabled people better access in their homes.
- Our Warm Homes Officer completed 290 energy audits to help people make their homes more fuel efficient.
- Additional locks and security items were fitted to 41 properties of vulnerable individuals to ensure that they felt safe in their own homes.
- Produced a Health Action Plan to show how the Council's services contribute to Public Health.
- Delivered the Exercise Referral Scheme 199 participants took place in 13/14 with 3854 attendances.
- Delivered Activity Clubs for children who witnessed domestic abuse.
- Secured a £60,000 Air Quality Grant from DEFRA with regard to AQ on the M1 motorway in Blaby District.
- New Get Active programme for residents of Braunstone Town and Blaby, 102 residents signed up to a variety of activities.
- Signed up to the Local Dementia Action Alliance to improve the quality of life of people living with dementia and their carers in the district.
- Working in partnership with the Rural Community Council to set up a Good Neighbour Scheme in Croft and Sharnford looking at the needs or isolation in our communities
- We received a 'Good' Ofsted rating for our Children's Sure Start Centres in December 2013.


AN EASTER ESCAPE

OLD SCHOOL SURGERY – STONEY STANTON PUBLIC NOTICE- IMPACT ON LOCAL HEALTHCARE SERVICES

We wish to bring to the attention of all our patients that we can no longer in all conscience continue to provide healthcare services without informing them of the situation in relation to the community healthcare service. Such is the scale of our concern we have had to resort to this public notice.

In 2010, The Old School Surgery was struggling as the 5th most under funded Practice in the whole of Leicestershire (84 Practices). Average funding across Leicestershire was £72.95 per patient. Some practices were receiving in excess £113 per patient. The Old School Surgery received £61 per patient yet met the same standard of care and breadth of services as the most funded Practices.

To address this inequality, in accordance with the Primary Care Strategy, the NHS employers and General Practice Committee agreed that all under funded Practices receive a Fairness in Funding adjustment. This meant The Old School Surgery received £48,744 per annum to reach the minimum local funding target of £72.95 per patient. With this money we immediately employed a GP.

Since that time, there has been:

- * A real terms decline in general practice funding of 17.1%
- * An increase in local community population of 16% due to housing developments
- * A substantial shift in hospital services into general practice
- * An increase in utility bill/insurance/locum doctor expenses/training costs/expenses
- * Last year alone the Old School Surgery prescribing budget was cut by £47,000.

This is set against a background of a growing population that is ageing, with increasing numbers of patients suffering from multiple and complex medical conditions and demands. At 5.05 pm on 31.3.14, (the last day of the financial year) we received an e-mail from Lesley Harrison, N England Local Area Team contract manager (following Government policy), that the Fairness in Funding adjust of £47,595 is to be withdrawn forthwith. The Old School Surgery is now being thrown into a worse position than 2010. This will have a significant impact for the local community upon and access to local Healthcare.

We thus ask for your understanding as we fight to preserve the excellent Healthcare service that The Old School Surgery currently provides. We urge you to join with our Patient Participation Group and to contact the following individuals to make your concerns known as this situation will affect you directly.
