

SHARNFORD PARISH COUNCIL Sporting Opportunity in Sharnford

A valuable village amenity, the Sharnford Cricket Ground, is available to rent. It has some facilities on site, including electricity, water and changing rooms. It would be suitable for junior sports such as football and rugby; other suggestions have been tennis and bowls.

The sports field has become available because Sharnford Cricket Club has closed; this once had three teams, one senior and two junior sides. In recent years it has been more difficult to recruit up and coming players, which of late has just left the club with just a senior side. However, this was disbanded in July for a number of reasons, mainly because of the commitment involved

with cricket matches taking up a whole day – either Saturday or Sunday. Also the age of some of the players and with few up and coming new players it has meant they could no longer continue.

It would be nice if we could find a local sporting club to continue at the ground. Ideally cricket could be continued to be played there. Other junior sporting activities have been suggested and the most favourable would be football or rugby.

A BUMP & CONSEQUENCES – SHARNFORD 1789

Sharnford village tongues are wagging. 'With childe', 'she's no better than she ought to be', 'led him on' said some! Whatever the outcome, opinion would be surely weighted against poor unmarried 20-year-old Elizabeth Crane now pregnant. It was nearly always the case in bygone days – the men always took the high moral ground. Wasn't their fault?

Elizabeth Crane was the 2nd. eldest child of seven to Thomas Crane and Sarah (nee Coltman), and was christened 25 July: 1769 at Ashby Parva. Records show the family living respectively at Leire, Ashby Parva and then at Sharnford by 1785. Sadly, two of the Crane children died here in 1785 – Susannah 1 year and John 4 years. Elizabeth's elder brother Nathaniel was married at St. Helen's to Sarah Elliott 17 May 1789.

A woman discovered pregnant and subsequently giving birth, outside of marriage, and apart from the social stigma attached to such behaviour, would become chargeable to the charitable parish purse to mitigate distress under the Parish and Poor Law Act, especially if the putative father failed to admit his responsibility. And Thomas Lord was not about to admit that. Thomas Lord was christened in St. Helen's Sharnford 30 Aug;1767, the 3rd. eldest child of John Lord and Elizabeth (nee Smalley). John Lord, Thomas's father, was the licensee and a freeholder/ landowner of the Blue Bell Tavern (the white house in the picture below). And that gave him the right to appear on the electoral roll (non-freeholders were



not) and to have his say in village matters.

The village elders were far from happy with the situation. In the first instance, Parish and Poor Law problems such as this, were deemed to be resolved at source by a meeting (or examination as it was then called), that would put heavy pressure on the reputed father to

financially maintain the child. We know from papers who was on that board - Joseph Sanders (-1795) churchwarden; Mr. Jarratt, Overseer of the Poor; Gabriel Nixon (1738-1818), parish clerk; and Sharnford's incumbent 77-year-old vicar (in 1789) John Horton.

Quite a messy brouhaha from all accounts – for we understand that Thomas's father John Lord, involved Thomas Almey of Earl Shilton (see next paragraph). In what capacity we just don't know. If the putative father resisted signing a bastardy Bond, (which Thomas Lord did), the parish officials could apply to the Justices for an Affiliation order which (if proved by a Magistrates Court) forced the father to pay for the upkeep of the child.

And that was what happened. Next we hear is that an Affiliation order being invoked; and that Thomas Lord, John Lord and Thomas Almey were summoned on a surety of £20 each to appear before the Easter Quarter Sessions at Leicester Castle 1789. (These Quarter Sessions held immense powers even over life deportation or public execution – but obviously not for bastardy).

The court examination did not go well for Thomas Lord. He was adjudged to be the



putative father and was fined £17s. 6d. to be paid to Elizabeth for 'lyeing in' (confinement) and a weekly maintenance of 1s.6p. per week; this was to be paid to the Overseer of the Poor of the parish of Ullesthorpe. This would be paid until the child reached the age of apprenticeship a tender 11 years old. The Quarter Session records show Elizabeth to be living now at Ullesthorpe; and was judged in her absence to be partly responsible - and was fined a weekly payment of 6d. to be paid to the said overseers. No doubt John Lord. Thomas's father, tried to make some

'wriggle' room by involving Thomas Almey - but the judges were clearly unimpressed.

Looking into further bastardy cases of that time, a fine of 2s. per week seems to be normal. But the fines could be *pro rata* if the putative father was a married man with children. We know from papers that John Lord – Thomas's father – was already bound by a promissory Bond to the parish to provide support and upkeep for his deceased sister's (Susannah 1760 – 1783) illegitimate daughter Ann Bray Lord (born 1779). Probably this may go some way to explain his spirited defence at the examination of his son. We have no idea why the child's father Allen Bray was not made financially responsible.

And where was Elizabeth Crane? Her testimony was not required it seems. She was busy birthing a male child who was duly christened Thomas Lord Crane at Claybrook Magna parish church 9 April 1789. (Ullesthorpe does not have an Anglican church).

A fine of 1s. 6d. (7¹/₂ pence today) a week does not appear excessive. But



200 years ago this was a huge piece of a man's weekly earnings. To give some idea the rates of employment for, say, a farm labourer working long hours getting in the harvest, could earn 7 to- 8s./ per six day working week (with free farm beer). Contempory prices for a locally bought mega sized 3lbs. 4ozs. loaf of bread would cost a shilling in those days. A pound of cheese was 9d. By juggling and careful planning a man's wages could just about provide food, clothing and shelter for his family.

Thomas Lord is mentioned in court to be a servant – and no doubt his income would be cushioned and perhaps provided by his publican landlord father John.



Perhaps lastly to provide some idea of what Sharnford looked like in 1789. The population for the parish in the year 1801 contained 77 houses, inhabited by 81 families consisting of 181 males, 193 females - a total of 373. Sharnford village, as today, contained no woods. 10 July 1783, the village post windmill (top of Mill Lane), was struck by lightning during a violent thunderstorm and suffered catastrophic damage. 1780 saw a foot and horse bridge built in place of the old pedestrian bridge. The new bridge did duty until 1841 when a more permanent one that was wide enough for carriages and waggons, was built. This was again partially rebuilt in blue brick in 1884 - it survives today - it is the smaller of Sharnford's two bridges).

A contemporaneous description of Sharnford comes from the historian John Nichols, obviously a regular visitor, who stayed with Rector John Horton (1712-1793), at Sharnford rectory ... 'this town has somewhat improved in its buildings of late years. The houses stand on each side of the stream, which divides them, as it were into two little villages; the upper or eastern part of which is more elevated and healthy than the lower part, which is liable to floods, fogs, and damp.' Nothing new there then!

Thomas Lord died 31 Dec 1789 aged just 22 years -8 months after the christening of his son Thomas Lord Crane. Elizabeth Crane (1769 – 2 July: 1846) never married. She lived the remainder of her life at Ullesthorpe. The census for 1841 shows her to be a sch oolmistress aged 68 years with 2 of her grandchildren living with her.

Thomas Lord Crane married Martha Needham at Broughton Astley 13 Oct: 1807. He died in 1859 in Claybrooke at the age of 69 years...

REPORT FROM YOUR MEMBER OF PARLIAMENT – ALBERTO COSTA

It has been a real pleasure to represent South Leicestershire in the House of Commons and I am incredibly grateful to residents for providing me with this wonderful opportunity. In May this year I completed my first full year as your MP and would like to report back on my experiences of representing you in



Parliament and I would also like to tell you about some projects and plans that I will be working on in the next year or so.

The constituency, being semi-rural in nature, presents a wide and varying number of differing issues. We have rolling countryside and lovely picturesque villages, such as



Sharnford and Sapcote, but also more urban areas too, so while the constituency does present challenges, these are challenges my team and I are more than happy to help to address.

In order to take a more proactive and responsive approach to assisting my constituents, I have opened a new Parliamentary office in

Blaby village dedicated to supporting the local community and the wider constituency. I am particularly proud to be the first MP in the history of the constituency to open an office of this nature, and for those readers who may have concerns or issues they wish to discuss I would encourage them to visit my constituency office as my team are on hand to arrange an appointment and assist you with your issue – details of my office can be found in my website which I have included a link to below.

While my Parliamentary duties understandably take up much of my time, I do dedicate a great amount of time to visiting schools, businesses and organisations in the constituency and with regard to Sharnford, I am very pleased to say that my family and I very much enjoyed attending this year's Sharnford Fete and I am very thankful to Sharnford Parish Council for their kind invitation.

Visits of these nature are of the upmost importance, not only to ensure that community leaders, charities and stakeholders have someone they can speak to and share their views, but it's also a great way for me to gain an insight into the brilliant and interesting things happening around the constituency. I have been hugely impressed by the visits I have undertaken so far; particularly the levels of enthusiasm and dedication of so many people I have met.

Sharnford has been a village I have greatly enjoyed visiting on numerous occasions, and I am particularly grateful to the members of the Sharnford Traffic Action Group (STAG) who have brought to my attention the very important and significant traffic and vehicular issues that are affecting many residents of both Sharnford and the wider constituency. I know instances of near misses and accidents have been well publicised and STAG have been very kind in bringing me up to date with issues of this nature that have been concerning residents of Sharnford.

Earlier this year I organised a meeting between representatives from the Parish Council, STAG and Leicestershire County Council in order to comprehensively discuss this issue. As a result of this meeting I will, this year, be writing to all residents of Sharnford with a simple, but detailed, survey on this incredibly important matter.

I would greatly welcome your views on this subject and would be grateful if you could please take a few moments to read the survey and answer the questions as your feelings dictate. I will be sending out this survey in order to gain the views of residents concerning this issue and how best the village of Sharnford believe this issue should addressed. Following receipt of the completed surveys I will then take the results forward and continue to work closely with partners and stakeholders at a local and national level to ensure that the issues raised, and the measures chosen, will be given the proper due attention and consideration.

I look forward to writing to the residents of Sharnford with this survey soon and look forward to hearing back from the residents in due course. With your assistance and support, I am hopeful that we can address this issue concerning Sharnford and ensure that both the village and the constituency is a safer place for all.

We will start again in September with our traditional fish and chip supper and then, on **September 21st**, the tea meetings will start up again at 3pm on alternate Wednesday afternoons.


We would welcome new members to come and join us for table games, cards and darts, followed by cakes and sandwiches. We would like to thank all those who donated cakes

THE COUNTRYMAN Soon to be under new ownership




