### SHARNFORD BELL RINGERS COMMEMORATE WORLD WAR 1

On October 4th, a full peal was rung on the bells of St Helen's church, to commemorate the death, 100 years ago, of a Sharnford bell ringer. This is how it came about :-

The Central Council of Church Bell Ringers hold a 'Rolls of Honour' to commemorate those ringers who fell in the Great War 1914-1918 and the 1939-1945 War.

The Council commissioned a handwritten Memorial Book for each War. These books can be viewed in a display case on the way up to the ringing chamber at St Paul's Cathedral, London. The Central Council of Church Bell Ringers website contains photographic copies of the pages of each Book together with a listing of the text. Each entry shows the ringer's name, initials, home tower and society name where known.

In recent years much more information has become accessible on the website of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission and additional names have been obtained from ringing societies and individual ringers. Alan Regin, the current Steward of the Rolls of Honour, has collected and organised this material to provide updated and more complete lists of casualties. The additional information includes age, date of death, rank, regiment, and cemetery/memorial where known. Alan's growing collection of photographs of headstones and memorials is also gradually being added to.

Through his research Alan identified Private George Atkins Mason, a bell ringer at St Helen's Sharnford, as one of the casualties. Private Mason does not feature on the War Memorial at Sharnford; he was a resident of Dares Walk, Hinckley who travelled to Sharnford to ring here and he is listed on the memorial in Hinckley. He was a member of the Northumberland Fusiliers 12/13 Bn. He was born in 1881 and prior to enlisting he worked in the hosiery trade. He died on 4 October 1917. He is commemorated at Tyne Cot Memorial, Belgium.

Early in 2014 Alan launched a campaign for ringers nationally to commemorate the

centenary of each of the deaths by ringing a full peal of 5000+ changes, taking approximately 3 hours, in the tower in which they rang. Fortunately for Alan's research, there were not too many casualties known to be ringers Leicestershire. The anniversaries of the soldiers from Whetstone who died in 1916 were not marked with a peal. A quarter peal was rung at Anstey in July 2017 for their late ringer. The final known Leicestershire ringers' deaths were from Quorn, who died in 1918, they will be commemorated in 2018.

Arrangements were put in place to ring at Sharnford on 4th October 2017. Permission was obtained, the village was told of the commemoration and the ringers had learned methods that were particularly appropriately named. Alan had agreed to find time in his busy schedule to ring. As is customary for peals the ringers shut the doors securely so that they would not be disturbed as peals require a great deal of concentration.

Unfortunately, due to a lack of communication, not of the bell ringers making, after they had been ringing for over two hours, a group of hand-bell ringers and a choir let themselves in the church for a rehearsal. They had no idea a 'full peal' was in progress, and obviously this disturbed the concentration of the ringers so they had to stop ringing, well short of the required length. The ringing could therefore only be claimed as a 'long length'.

In his research Alan Regin found another Sharnford resident who had perished in the Great War and his name has been added to the refurbished war memorial. Alan was also instrumental in organising the funding and installation of the set of eight 'Ring of Bells'

for St Georges Church in Ypes, Belgium, to commemorate WW1. More about this fascinating story in the next Issue.

Some members of the original band of ringers were joined by others and rang a peal on 10<sup>th</sup> November, to commemorate the end of the Battle of Passchendale.

### SHARNFORD TRAFFIC ACTION GROUP (STAG)



### Average Speed Cameras are coming to Sharnford.

The signs have appeared on B4114 and Aston Lane after what appears to be a delayed start. We expected the cameras to be installed and working by end of September. The latest update from Leicestershire County Council – Highways Department gives an anticipated fully operational system by Spring 2018.

STAG have been pushing for Average Speed Cameras, or something similar, to improve

traffic safety and reduce pollution through Sharnford for at least the last twelve years, so we can wait for another few months! In view of likely forthcoming developments, as identified below, it could not be more timely.

### New development by DPD for a parcel hub on A5 adjacent to Jurys Inn Hotel

Following on from discussion with IM Properties who are the developers for this site, we have received a letter attempting to answer our concerns about the potential impact on traffic through Sharnford. The developer's specialist transport consultants have indicated that there would only be a modest increase in traffic volume of 20 vehicles per hour, at the most. They would say that wouldn't they.... We measure traffic flow on B4114 through Sharnford which fluctuates between 45000 and 60000 vehicles per week. It will be interesting to see what the increase will be, as working on a 5-day working week at 12 hours per day would only increase traffic flow by between 2 and 2.6%. This is a ridiculously low figure for such a large development, especially if employee traffic is included.



### **Speeding continues**

Even with the average speed signs now in place we still see the sad red face on the speed monitor. This means that vehicles are driving over the pedestrian crossing above 30mph!!

I hope these drivers have deep pockets because they will be fined once the cameras are in place.

In November cars were travelling at 70mph on Aston Lane as they passed Brindley's Haulage yard. Even worse a motorbike was seen travelling at 113mph just before it

reached the junction with the B4114.

Can you spot the speed monitor? because it spots you!!

Over 20% of all vehicles on Aston Lane break the 30mph speed limit. Unfortunately, average speed cameras are not being installed on the lane which puts pedestrians, cyclists, horse riders, and ducks at risk. We all still need to bring pressure to bear on councils and government to rectify this. *Join STAG now!*


The competition aims to raise the profile of modern

#### 'A POOR CHILD OF THE PARIFH'

John Bason was born in the year 1797, the second child of five (there may have been more children), to unmarried John and Susan(nah) Bason of Sharnford (no marriage details could be found despite extensive searches). An unusual family with only one child christened, this was not John. He was to spend his formative years being 'put to the frame' as we can see by this remarkable surviving document below, when at the age of 11 he was apprenticed to a Sharnford village frame-work knitter, Joseph Tilley.

The Bason family lived in impoverished circumstances. It is revealed to us in the parish Overseers of the Poor account book, that disbursements of parish money and goods, commenced from October 1793, to this family. There are literally many dozens of entries paid out and goods given to Susan Bason e.g. '1 and a half c. of coal at 1/6d, 10 yds of linen for shirts and shifts at 10/-, 28 weeks Su.Bason 9 (weeks) at 5/6d and 19 (weeks) at 6/-. pd towards shoes 2/-'

The money was nearly always paid to Susan, never her 'husband' John - which can be probably be explained by this item which appeared 4 Oct:1800 – 'lent to Jno. Bason which was not paid back - 5/-!!!'. It would seem John Bason was not spending the money wisely. It was end of childhood for young John Bason 'a poor child of the parifh' mentioned in this document below dated 11 April 1808. He was to be taught and instructed in the 'Art, Trade and Myftery' of the framework knitter by Joseph Tilley, his now Master. He was apprenticed until he was twenty-one years of age – a ten year commitment. He was expected to dwell in the house of the Master, Joseph Tilley, who was to provide food, clothing and a bed, but no wages. Conditions that applied



in another contempory apprenticeship indenture but not specified in our document (they varied from parish to parish), were that young John - would not play cards, roll dice, imbibe drink, steal from the Master, visit alehouses or get married. Tough conditions. We don't know what sort of a master Joseph Tilley was to John Bason - but a search of St. Helen's church records reveals some interesting family detail. A Sharnford man, son of John Tilley - Joseph was Christened here 4 June 1777. He married a Sharnford girl Elizabeth Welton 12 July 1802 also here. As far as can be determined there were five female children from this union – Sarah. Ann, Elizabeth, Mary and Betsy. Multiple Christening dates of the children confuses things as to the true age of these girls, but we know Betsy died aged 14 years in August 1839. As a total family cottage industry commitment, these girls from the age of eight or even less, would be set to work seaming the stocking produced in the 'flat' by a worker like John Bason on this machine illustrated. Joseph Tilley was buried at St. Helen's, Sharnford -



21 March :1850 aged 73 years. **Above** – Framework knitting machine circa 1840. Looking like an instrument of torture – but an innovation of its day – cumbersome but effective. It remained relatively unchanged for 150 years. John Bason would become well acquainted with this contraption.


John on completion of his apprenticeship, married a Sharnford girl, Elizabeth Harrison – 22 Apr:1821 in Sharnford. Soon to follow came the children – **eleven!!!** Mary (1821) Thomas (1823 - died an infant) John (1825) Martha (1829) Ruth (1832) Elizabeth (1834) Ann (1836) Thomas (1838) Joseph (1840) Alice (1847) and William (1844). At the time of John Bason's apprenticeship, the cottage industry of the framework hosiery knitter had reached its zenith, but within a few short years, the late 1820's, it would begin a terminal decline due to the mechanical achievements of the advancing industrial age. A few pockets survived through this, including Joseph Tilley, but for John Bason, he railed against the hosiery trade and we see him in 1841,1851,1861,1871 census working as a gardener.

- John Bason was buried at St. Helen's, Sharnford - 27 January 1880 aged 83 years.
- Susan(nah) Bason (John's mother)
   was buried at St. Helen's Sharnford
   8 July 1851 aged 86 years.

The Bason's poverty was not alone in Sharnford. For the half year Apr:1808 to October 1808 – (out of a population of 394) – accounts show there was 19 from Sharnford, of which 5 were children



including a 'Bason's childe', 4 widow's, were in and out of the poor house at Ullesthorpe. (see photo right). Sharnford was united with the parishes of Broughton



Astley, Ullesthorpe and Claybrooke in establishing this poor house - dubbed the House of Industry – at Ullesthorpe. Newly completed in 1803, it took in and Sharnford's poor homeless. Records survive showing our Sharnford poor from 1806 to 1828 in the Ullesthorpe workhouse. Expenditure paid out by Sharnford parish for our poor for the six month period April -October 1808 were......'General expense at poorhouse £7-3-10, To provision same £12-0-0, To clothing same £3-17-3 and a half pence.' Offset against this total was 'Rec. by work at the poorhouse £3-5-7'. Prior to 1803 our village poor had to fend best for themselves as they could, living by charitable gifts of money and goods dispensed by the village Overseer of the Poor, who for the year 1803, was John Ashmore.

It was not all plain sailing at Ullesthorpe with which Sharnford had such close associations. About 1810 a furore was caused by the curate of Claybrooke (in those days Ullesthorpe was in the parish of Claybrooke) by not allowing sepulchre (burial) of a Sharnford pauper who had died in Ullesthorpe poorhouse.

Sapcote quickly followed suit, building altogether a much larger affair by 1806.

Taking in the poor from 15 neighbouring parishes – Stanton, Earl Shilton, Barwell, Desford, Thurlaston, Barlestone, Bagworth, Aston Flamville, Wigston Parva, Dunton Bassett, Cosby, Whetstone, Croft and Leicester Forrest.

It survived as a refuge until 1840, when all inmates were transferred to Hinckley's large brand new, built for purpose 'House of Industry'. After 1840,

Sapcote's workhouse became a farm ,followed by a later conversion to 6 cottages till eventually demolished in 1959.

Research sources - Leics. Record Office, Apprenticeship indentures, Churchwardens Accounts Book (Sharnford) DE2401/8, Overseers of the Poor Accounts (Sharnford) DE2410/10, Pugh's History of Leicestershire.

Lastly, one 'chestnut' from the accounts book for Sharnford dated 2 Dec: 1807. Sharnford village militia drilled every Sunday (the spectre of Napoleon invading England was always omnipresent) – 'a surgeon called out to the militia - 5/-'. Accident or horseplay?


