SHARNFORD TRAFFIC ACTION GROUP (STAG)

In 2005 - A village meeting was called, headed by a group of village mothers of young children, to discuss and tackle the ever-worsening traffic problem faced by the village. Speeding cars, Quarry Lorries and numerous HGV's all added to the problem. This made the village very dangerous and was ruining the environment. As a result of this meeting STAG was formed. The group initially tried to tackle the problem by contacting Leicestershire County Council, Leicestershire Constabulary and local councilors and MP's - all to no avail. We were continually told that there was not a traffic problem in Sharnford.

In 2006 - STAG signed up to a new initiative launched by Leicestershire Constabulary - Speedwatch. The group undertook a 4-week project of monitoring and recording speeding vehicles at various sites around the village. The official figures were astounding with a maximum of 57mph being recorded, and this confirmed that a problem did exist.

In conjunction with the Speedwatch programme the Leicestershire Constabulary covertly monitored speed, size of vehicles and volume of traffic on a daily basis. STAG also carried out its own Traffic Surveys. Our results and the Leicestershire Constabulary figures concluded that approx. 3 million vehicles pass through Sharnford annually. That is a lot of vehicles for a village 'B' road. Worryingly the figures showed that 1000+ HGV's per day passed through the village.

In 2006 - a DVD was created with the support of a local video company and was sent to Newspapers, all major Local and National TV channels, Leicestershire County Council, Leicestershire Constabulary, Councillors, MP's MEP's and anyone else we could think of who could help us to highlight the traffic issues

Within days we had been on all 5 national TV channels, 2 local TV channels, local radio, Five live radio and in all local newspapers. Suddenly Leicestershire County Council was listening and summoned us for a meeting! We had nearly a year of negotiations with them. The outcome being that they agreed that Sharnford long term should have a bypass and short-term options were needed to slow down traffic. Some of the things which have been done are new brighter lights on the zebra crossing and 30MPH warning signs at both ends of the village, along with a council pollution monitor

In 2009 - A Sharnford Bypass Feasibility Study was completed which gave two options for a new bypass, directly linking the B4114 to Junction 2 of the M69, by-passing both Sharnford and Sapcote, being the preferred option. It was expected that the bypass would relieve both Sharnford and Lutterworth of the majority of HGV traffic. The cost estimate at the time was £6.6 million..



In 2014 - A Speed Monitor was purchased which would be used by STAG to measure speeds and volume of vehicles travelling though the village. At about this time we realised that the pollution monitors had been removed. Nationally the results of these analyses were found to be too embarrassing for the County Councils and Central Government.

By July 2015 the speed monitor was in use, registering speeds and traffic volumes on

B4114 and, at times, on Aston Lane. The data collected is still being passed to all interested parties, police, county and borough council, and our new MP. With the mounting pressure brought to bear by Alberto Costa MP, the late Ernie White, County Councillor, and members of STAG, together with local press and TV, plus the significant high volumes and speeds registered, Leicestershire County Council have decided to fund the installation of Average Speed Cameras on B4114. Hopefully these will be in operation by September 2018.

Future - STAG is to push for Average Speed Cameras on Aston Lane in an attempt to reduce the number of vehicles travelling above 30 MPH from the 63% currently measured. Every week there are vehicles

travelling at over 60 mph with some achieving over 80 mph.


FILMS IN SHARNFORD



THE CURIOUS STORY OF ANN HOLYOAK

This was to be a tale of exceptional hardship and endurance – Ann, a lone young Sharnford woman with three small girls, who crossed oceans to be reunited with their absent father and husband. Soon to be widowed, pregnant, living in the wilderness of a strange foreign land in a tent with a knife by her side.....The scene is set.....read on.

Ann was christened on 13th June 1824 at St. Helen's, Sharnford, the fourth eldest child of nine, to blacksmith William and Jane Holyoak, of Sharnford. She received a privileged education as we can see by her handwritten signature from her marriage document.




Her education was unusual especially for a working class girl of the 1820's and, we have to assume (since Sharnford school was not built till 1847), that Ann's education may have been at St. Helen's church which held impromptu tuition under the tutelage of the then incumbent Rector Joseph Cotman. A quote from the Leicester Advertiser 15 April 1977, St.Helens...... 'in the 1800's Sharnfords first school was held there, as the rector then was schoolmaster, too. The door in to the tower by which the children entered has long since been closed'.

At the age of seventeen, Ann was living at home with her family on the Pridmore farm at Mickle Hill, Aston Flamville (1841 census). The Pridmore's were her father William's, in laws. By the age of twenty-three, Ann was living in Leicester's Oxford Street (from her marriage certificate) where she had met and married Thomas Meadows Baum, a butcher, at St. Mary's de Castro church – 12 October 1847.

Ann was pregnant before she married. Her parents would not have been enamoured by this unfortunate incident for we know how they dealt with the result of Ann's elder sister Elizabeth - who gave birth to an illegitimate child, Mary, in 1838. Mary was placed in a female orphanage in Leicester on the early death of her mother Elizabeth in 1841.

Thomas and Ann's butchery business was well established and had expanded into flour, bread and provisions, at 12 Bull Head Street, Wigston Magna. Some signs of affluence are apparent – the addition of an apprentice butcher and a domestic servant.

Ann and Thomas now have two children. Things look good for the family......when Thomas is declared bankrupt (Leicester Mercury 25 Oct. 1851). To make ends meet Ann becomes a midwife (her business card shown is shown to the right)

This was her mother-in-laws – Maria Baum - profession and who no doubt, taught and instructed Ann in the art of midwifery.

Now husband Thomas disappears.....

* Thomas's insouciance at Ann's predicament is staggering. She was left with three small children – Emma (1848); Mary Ann (1850); William Henry (1851); and pregnant – perhaps Thomas did not know – with no known income other than what she could earn from midwifery and sewing. She would not have been able to claim assistance



under the Poor Law of Wigston because of not being born there herself. It was not long before Ann was in trouble with the law – accused of stealing clothing and boots (Leicester Mercury 15 Oct: 1853) - which luckily for her was not pursued in the courts – the evidence being insufficient.

Thomas Meadows Baum had taken flight. Family stories abound to what became of Thomas – joined the army – served in a war – deserted the army – we are unable to confirm any of these. War Office records do not indicate that he was ever in the British or Colonial Army. But we do know Thomas surfaces in the new Eldorado, the goldfields of Australia!

There is written evidence that Thomas was in Australia by 1854. His daughter Maria was born here at home in England around that time. So where was Thomas between October 1851 and 1854?


* We are unable to account for Thomas's time between his bankruptcy and when he sailed overseas. Certainly he would have been facing a debtors jail if he reneged on paying off his debts. They were still in operation in the 1850,s – whereby destitute persons who were unable to pay a court ordered judgement would be locked away until they found secured outside funds. It is likely that Thomas was constantly on the move all this time in fear of being jailed, and this proved the catalyst that prompted his departure for overseas.

He now sends for Ann and the children to join him.

❖ Ann loved Thomas undoubtedly- to embark with the children on such a dangerous journey to follow him to the other side of the world unaccompanied − well, she would not have done that if they were not in constant communication or that Thomas had done wrong by her.

After a train journey Wigston, from Rugby and Birmingham Liverpool, Baum and three of her four children Emma, Mary Ann and Maria sailed from Liverpool 7th, March 1859 aboard the Black Ball Line clipper British Trident captained by O'Neill. Right -is an edited passenger list showing Ann and the children.

She chose to sail under the 'alias' Hollyhock, and not her married name Baum. Yet the children's names and ages are



correct for the year 1859. Curious. Perhaps she had something to hide. Missing from the list is her son William Henry (born 1851) and who was the only one of her children to be




christened at Sharnford, (1858). William was to be left behind with his grandparents William and Jane Holyoak now living in Sharnford.

Left – an unnamed Black Ball Line (note the flag) clipper – often referred to as a 'packet' of the late 1850's. Ann and the children would have travelled steerage class – the cheapest at £14 – children at half price.

Ann and the three girls arrived in Melbourne harbour, Australia 9^{th} .June 1859 - a passage of some 93 days.

After arrival in Australia, the family journeyed 114 miles NE of Melbourne to the Daisy Hill Creek gold fields (subsequently called Amherst), where they were reunited with her husband, a complete family once more. Home was to be a tent.

Amherst, Victoria, was a tented township of miners. The few wooden buildings being the Anglican and Presbyterian churches, and the ubiquitous bars and grog shops -with the more prosperous miners living in wooden shacks and buildings. The 1861 Aust. census shows a population of 2060 for Amherst where males outnumbered the females 2 to 1. Statistics also in the census say there was well over 200 people living in tents at that time.

Tragedy struck the Baum family with the death on 6th March 1861 of Thomas Meadows Baum who died as a result of a mining accident. His death certificate informs us his death was due to 'a *fracture of the spine caused by a fall of earth whilst mining*' sustained some five weeks earlier. He was then 36 years old, born in Leicestershire but it also informs us 'not married'. Curious, these last words we cannot explain.

Widowhood must have been difficult and fraught for Ann for she was left in 1861 - pregnant once again (either to be a stillborn or infant death) and with four girls aged 12, 11, 7 and a new borne infant to be called Elizabeth Jane. Home was still a tent.

There is story which has come down through the family of Ann always having a butcher's knife by her side. One night a large hand was seen coming under the canvas of the tent. Ann called out 'get that hand out or I'll cut it off'. This was the measure of the woman – she had now morphed into a tough, formidable frontier woman.

December 1861.....Ann and her children were now at Amphitheatre, Vic – where her latest child Elizabeth Jane was registered. A succession of townships followed – Majorca, Boort. Somewhere in one of these she was to meet widower William Davey – her next husband.

❖ William Davey (1823-1883) was born in Truro, Cornwall. He emigrated to Australia aboard the Warrior in 1840. He subsequently married Elizabeth Hancock in 1845 and together they had 16 children! Three of these children were born at Amherst and it is quite possible Ann Baum assisted with the delivery of one or more for she was in Amherst at that time. Another three children were born at Majorca, Vic. − again it is possible that Ann was the midwife. Ann's eldest daughter Emma was married in Majorca. Elizabeth Davey, William's wife, died Dec: 1870 in Amherst..

William Davey and Ann Baum were married 9th April 1871. Not only this – but two of Ann's children followed by marrying two of William Davey's grown up sons – Elizabeth Jane to James Davey in 1878 (7 children); and Maria to Henry Davey in 1880 (5 children). Ann's oldest daughter Emma married in 1869, a Thomas Hurse. (10 children). That makes a total of 22 grandchildren names and birthdays for Ann to remember!

This is the only known photograph relating to Ann Holyoak – albeit two of her Australian grandchildren (Alice and Priscilla Hurse) that connects to our story. It is surprising that there are no others within the family. One would have thought perhaps Ann and William's wedding photo would have survived and come to light – but unfortunately not.

* Right - The two daughters of Emma Hurse nee Baum – Ann's eldest daughter. The reverse of this photo reads 'my grandmother (right) and her sister taken 1908. They had quite a privileged life; a good education; art, music lessons in Melbourne, their parents and brothers back on the farm'.

Ann Holyoak-Baum-Davey died 1 Jan: 1894 at Paddington, Boort, Victoria, Australia – she never returned home to England or ever saw her son William Henry again.



SHARNFORD PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

As you are aware there has been significant progress on bringing the Parish Council up to date, with several Parish Council members attending a training session to increase their knowledge and expertise to keep the Parish running smoothly

At the last Parish Council meeting on the 16th of August there was a lengthy agenda with more correspondence than usual. For those with a computer details of this can now be viewed on the revamped Sharnford Village website by clicking on the appropriate link (www.sharnfordparishcouncil.co.uk). Village groups can promote themselves with their own page on the website and residents can also promote events on here as well. Notices will still be posted on the various noticeboards around the village. Residents are welcome to use the village noticeboards, but Parish notices will take priority because of the lack of space and adverts will be removed after one month.

One notice that appeared on the noticeboards was about distraction burglaries, a crime which claims many victims. Part of the flyer has been reproduced highlighting some of the tactics of perpetrators of this sort of crime and how best to protect yourself from unexpected callers, especially in the remaining weeks of summer and the start of autumn season, remembering vigilance all the year round is needed.

Amongst other topics that were discussed was a footpath project that would link Sharnford and Sapcote, this would be subject to a feasibility study carried out by Sustrans, with the cost being split between the two parishes. Both parishes have to support the feasibility study financially if it is going to go ahead.

Plans to upgrade the play equipment in the park and Poors Meadow are being held up by a technical issue – a new governmental directive dating from 2015 putting such projects out to tender on a countrywide website to solicit more quotes and give better value for money.

KNOCK KNOCK, WHO'S THERE?

Not sure? Don't open the door

Sometimes people turn up unannounced with the intention of tricking their way into your home or overcharging you for a job. Always be cautious when someone you don't know calls at your door.

- LOCK Always keep your windows and doors locked, even when you are just popping out briefly
- STOP Ensure the back door is locked before answering the front door so that nobody can access your house while you are distracted
- CHAIN If you do decide to open the door, put the door bar or chain on first. Keep the chain on while you talk to the person on the doorstep. When the door is closed, remove the chain in case you need to get out quickly
- CHECK No ID? No entry! If a stranger wants to come in and claims that they are from a utility company, local authority or any other organisation, always ask for their ID, even if you were expecting them genuine callers will happily show you ID. Close the door and check the ID carefully. Call the head office if you are still unsure, but use the number from the telephone directory or a recent utility bill, not the one on their card

Bogus callers may be smartly dressed and can be convincing.

If in doubt, say you want to check with a family member before committing to anything and shut the door. If they are genuine they will understand.



GABRIEL'S JOURNEY

My name is Mary Collis. I have lived in Sharnford with my husband since 1970. We brought up our two children in the village. My husband, Clive was wicket–keeper and opening bat for Sharnford cricket club and i helped out with friends providing play activities for toddlers in the village.

I am now 74 years old and a retired university lecturer. I have written a novel, "Gabriel's journey" which has recently been published. It is a powerful story that I feel deserves to be told and one which I was inspired to write as a tribute to my brother who was diagnosed with Parkinson's disease some years ago but which progressed to dementia.

"Gabriel's journey" is a contemporary political thriller based largely on a true story in which present day events and past life events converge. Unfortunately my brother never got to read this tribute to his eventful life as he died a week after the publication of the book.





My brother's diaries which detailed his extensive world travels provided the research for the book in addition to my records of many revealing and interesting conversations I have had with him since his diagnosis.

These conversations alongside my insight into his personality allowed me a unique perspective into the effect of the disease on the workings of his mind. Many of the recent events described in the book emanated directly from these conversations.

THE SHARNFORD GOOD NEIGHBOUR SCHEME



We are pleased to report that the Good Neighbour Scheme continues to be well utilised, and we are able to help and support our community at times when they most need it, thanks to our team of very dedicated volunteers.

However, the Scheme does need to secure some funding for on-going expenses, such as our Public Liability Insurance, DBS checks that all

volunteers must have, marketing materials, and the dedicated scheme mobile phone fees. Therefore, members of the GNS Steering Group volunteer to support the annual village fete, and for a number of years now we run the bar – well someone has to do it! In exchange for this support, along with other charitable groups in the village, we receive a contribution from the Village Fete Committee, (who do a sterling job) which goes a long way to supporting some of our on-going costs.

Here's a picture of some of the SGN Scheme Steering Group members and other SGN scheme volunteers, embracing the Armed Forces theme for this year's Fete.

The scheme provides:

The offerings of short term help to anyone in the village, who from time to time might need some assistance

What sort of support is provided?

The support is provided by a group of local volunteers within the village, and includes:

Assistance around the house and home, for example: light gardening duties, small DIY jobs, cleaning, cooking a meal, shopping, help with letters and correspondence, or you may just want a friendly face to talk to occasionally.

We can also provide lifts for doctors, hospital or dental appointments, again for times when you have no one else to call upon.

Essentially it's there for when friends and family aren't available, or if your circumstances change, for example, if you have just returned from hospital, or perhaps recovering from an illness. *Please note the Scheme can provide support to anyone who is over the age of 18*.

Is there a charge for the support?

The support is provided free of charge by the volunteers, except for lifts, when there will be a charge to cover petrol expenses, for example, a lift to Hinckley and back is £3.00. We will always tell you in advance how much a journey will cost.

Who should I contact if I need support?

To request support please call <u>07502 615535</u>to speak to the Good Neighbour Scheme Coordinator. They will then find a volunteer to help with your request, and call you back to confirm who will be providing the support. Please note all our volunteers will be wearing an identity badge.
