SHARNFORD TRAFFIC ACTION GROUP (STAG)



Are they ON or are they OFF? The average speed cameras of course.

Confusion from Leicestershire County Council who have not verified the recent statement in the local press that the cameras have been switched off after only two months. According to Councillor Blake Pain, LCC Cabinet member responsible for Environment and Transport, only 84 vehicles have been logged speeding through the village since they were switched on in September. This is either fantastic news, showing a

massive reduction in speeding or, as I suspect, along with a number of other residents, the cameras at the Coventry Road end of the village are in the wrong place. At the time of going to print we are still waiting for feedback from Leicestershire County Council Highways Department. It would have been nice if the county council could have communicated this information to STAG and the Parish Council before going to the newspapers.

It is fair to say that a number of pedestrians as well as drivers have noticed a very remarkable drop in the speed of traffic passing through the village. The reduction in noise has also been commented on. One of our founder members Mike Lee, who lives in Stoney Stanton and has been driving through the village regularly for over 40 years, has said "It is very noticeable as you enter the village on the B4114 from the Sutton Elms direction how much more slowly the traffic is moving, and how speed descending the "hill" past the post office is much more controlled. It is also remarkable how much impatient tailgating has been reduced." He continued "The comparison with the visible traffic speeds in the STAG DVD made in 2006 is amazing!"

In the meantime, a few statistics, STAG have been electronically recording speeds and volumes of traffic in Sharnford since November 2015. In these three years over EIGHT MILLION vehicles have driven over the Pedestrian Crossing on the B4114, with TWO MILLION breaking the speed limit!! Currently the B4114 is on course to hit over three million vehicles per year. During this time, on Aston Lane, over 1.6 million vehicles have been registered, with over ONE MILLION being clocked speeding. Speeds in excess of 70mph have been recorded. During the 2020's expect to see volumes far in excess of three million vehicles per year when the new DPD Distribution Centre on the A5 and the National Rail Freight Interchange near Sapcote come online. In addition we have the Leicester & Leicestershire Strategic Growth Plan with its extra 96.580 homes!!! Eye watering figures.... COMMEMORATING THE END OF THE FIRST WORLD WAR



On Sunday the 11th November a very moving service was held at St Helen's to commemorate the ending of the Great War. Over 80 people attended in church and approximately 25 joined us at the War Memorial at 10.45 for the Remembrance. Colin Haddon from the Methodist Chapel led a moving service with Hymns and Prayers and

there was additional music and singing from the small singing group in the village.

The church inside was beautifully decorated with poppies and also the children from the school added some poignant paintings to the walls. Our District Councillor Sheila Scott laid the wreath from the Church and Chapel to remember the 13 young men from our village that lost their lives. Afterwards, there were refreshments, including edible poppy cakes! and a small exhibition was staged detailing those who died. It was a very moving Remembrance on this very important day. A collection was taken and £262 has been sent to the Royal British Legion.



A very special thank you goes to all those who knitted poppies to make the special drapes both in church and outside.



SHARNFORD'S LAND ARMY GIRLS

Ladies! How about this job opportunity of working outdoors in all weathers - a 50 hour working week in summer - 48 hour week in Brrrrr winter - with a wage of 28 shillings per week (£1.40p) and don't forget you will be paid much less than the male agricultural worker counterpart (38 shillings) for doing the same work! Oh, and there are, initially no paid or unpaid holidays - but you do get a free travel pass after working for 6 months.... Of course this would not do today, -gender pay and conditions, equality and all that - but IT DID HAPPEN 70 years ago and nobody Wartime makes complained. strange bedfellows.

Officially the government created the Women's Land Army in June 1939 (a direct descendant of a pilot women's volunteer scheme in 1917 - 1919) which lasted until its disbandment 21 October 1949. At first it asked for volunteers which were eventually to be supplemented by conscription – so that by 1944 it had over an 80,000 member workforce. With

menfolk volunteered or conscripted into the nations armed forces, it left a labour vacuum which was to be filled by these able young women to provide a new rural workforce. It was necessary to grow more food at home (to be less reliant on imported food stuffs) and increase the amount of land in cultivation. They were to make a significant contribution to boosting food production during the Second World War.

For 17 year old volunteer Jean B. it was something of a cultural shock when she was placed at WARAG, the Shade, Sharnford in 1943. WARAG stood for the wartime agricultural assist programme. A Leicester girl from the back streets 'who had never seen a field, let alone a cow', it became 'the best time of my life'. A similar story also for another 18 year old Leicester girl Rose J. who arrived at the Shade in 1944, both who became disenchanted with an early working life in hosiery factories and both volunteered for the Women's Land Army 'to do their bit'.

The Shade was allocated 4 ladies to fill the male vacuum created by conscription, billeted on the 'lovely' owners Mr.& Mrs. Cooper. These live-in facilities – food and board – came

at a price – a government standard of 14 shillings a week (70p) deducted from the 28 shilling per week which Jean B. says 'left us with very little'.

For Rose J., one her earliest memories was of 'stonepicking fields, a back breaking job'. But like Jean B., she soon graduated to the farms 2 dairies, and at milking they soon became very proficient.

Today Jean B. still treasures her excellence award diploma for milking she won in a competition in early 1944 .

Right –Here is Jean B. left and friend Cissy C. right – in full milking gear. Standards of hygiene were rigorous. Daily scrubbing out the concrete floor in the dairy wasn't a welcome job.

The Shade, with the status of being a top-draw WARAG farming community, attracted a government fact finding mission of the then current wartime Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, (Conservative), the 1st. Earl Hudson – Robert Pierce Hudson – seen here over-page in a photo at the Shade. This visit facilitated the Shade to receiving one of the first of the ubiquitous grey 'Fergie' tractors, which became the

preserve of Mr.Cooper; unfortunately the ladies were seldom allowed on it.

Right – the Minister of Agriculture, Robert Pierce Hudson – in trilby hat – at the Shade in 1944. He served from 1939 to 1945 until a general election that ushered in a Labour government. The Shade Land army girls here (from L to R) – unknown, Pat, and Jean B.

There were one or two other girls that were to pass through the Shade during the war years. This home had a slow turnover of the girls due to the opulence of the building, the space and privacy that it afforded and the good grace of the owners, the Coopers , who with their young daughter Margaret (seen here inquisitively just on the very edge of the photo) made them all very welcome.

The farming seasons came and went – planting, harvesting. Rose J. recalls 'spud picking'- ' there were tons of them'. Spare time, of which there was very little, was spent with laundry and personal appearance, weekend visits to parents, (all the girls became very homesick) and for leisure - the radio and Sharnford village Y.M.C.A. hall dances. There was also whist drives and film shows. It was here that Rose J., Jean B., Cissy C., Daisy G. were to meet their prospective husbands – all village young men. Rose J. remembers that the live music was 'very good' and was usually provided by the Sharnford Silver Band. It all points to a tremendous community feeling in those dark days.

Below left –From the Imperial War Museam collection. An evocative oil on canvas of Bedtime by W.L.A. girl Evelyn Mary Dunbar dated 1943. As larger numbers of women were recruited, hostels were set up to house land girls. By 1944, there were 22,000 land girls living in 700 hostels. Living conditions varied, and could be very basic.

Below right Understandably, not a popular addition to a ladies wardrobe! An overall coat made of drill marked with the WD broadmark and dated 1944, this item of protective clothing is seldom seen in photographs.



This photograph dated 11th October 1943 –is of the Land Army girls of Sapcote. This is shown because some of these girls serviced the smaller farms in Sharnford. Do note the wooden dormitory behind the ladies – it was a far cry from the palatial surroundings of the Shade.

One of these girls worked at Jarrett's farm (next to St.Helen's church). She was Esther Knight (**below**) who remained at the farm after the war ended.

Right – Joan Shaw, the first of six W.L.A. girls to marry Sharnford's young men between 1944 and 1948.. Joan served at Wayside Farm (junction of Coventry Road and Bumblebee Lane). She would also have been provisionally billeted at Sapcote.

The memories are fading, the old photographs in the



biscuit tin are getting dispersed or lost; such is the opportunity now to capture a moment in time before its gone



forever. With <u>grateful thanks</u> to a young 91 year old Rose J. and a 92 year old Jean B. Without their enjoyable reminiscences (and photographs), I could never have contemplated writing this piece. Thanks also go to Keith Hextall for his photograph of the Sapcote land army girls.

SHARNFORD SCHOOL PTA

It's been a little while since the last update, but with the autumn term well under way, it is time to share what the PTA have been up to and what we have planned into the new year.

We had our AGM at the start of November and managed to attract a couple of new faces, which is great. THE SHARNFORD GOOD NEIGHBOUR SCHEME

The Good Neighbour Scheme continues to be well utilised, and we are able to help and support our community at times when they most need it, thanks to our team of very dedicated volunteers.

Here's a quick reminder about what the scheme provides:

OFFERING SHORT TERM HELP TO ANYONE IN THE VILLAGE, WHO FROM TIME TO TIME MIGHT NEED SOME ASSISTANCE What sort of support is provided?

The support is provided by a group of local volunteers within the village, and includes:

- Assistance around the house and home, for example: light gardening duties, small DIY jobs, cleaning, cooking a meal, shopping, help with letters and correspondence, or you may just want a friendly face to talk to occasionally. Whilst some jobs may be deemed too big, it is rare that we say no to smaller jobs i.e. you may just need a light bulb changing, or a picture hanging.
- We can also provide lifts for essential appointments such as doctors, hospital or dental appointments, again for times when you have no one else to call upon.

Essentially it's there for when friends and family aren't available, or if your circumstances change, for example, if you have just returned from hospital, or perhaps recovering from an illness.

Please note the scheme isn't just for older people, we can provide support to anyone who is over the age of 18

Is there a charge for the support?

The support is provided free of charge by the volunteers, except for lifts, when there will be a charge to cover petrol expenses, for example, a lift to Hinckley and back is $\pounds 3.00$. We will always tell you in advance how much a journey will cost.

Who should I contact if I need support?

To request support please call our dedicated phone number: 07502 615535 to speak to the Good Neighbour Scheme Co-ordinator. They will then find a volunteer to help with your request, and call you back to confirm who will be providing the support. Please note all our volunteers will be wearing an identity badge.
