

MP backs 'exciting Lutterworth Line' railway plans

MP for South Leicestershire, Alberto Costa, has given his backing to 'exciting' plans from local campaigners to reopen a Rugby to Leicester railway line which was previously closed under the Beeching cuts in the 1960s.

The 'Lutterworth Line' proposals put forward by Sustainable Transport Northamptonshire would seek to reconnect the old railway line between Rugby and Leicester, and would include two new passenger stations at Lutterworth and Cosby – the route would also operate services between Northampton and Nottingham with a plan to link up the Magna Park logistics hub near Lutterworth.

The project would see the railway line following its original position on the Great Central railway adjacent to the M1 motorway before linking up with the Birmingham to Leicester line near the existing Narborough station.



The plans have been put forward by campaigners to the Government's 'Restore Your Railway Fund', which seeks to restore lost rail connections. The proposals have been submitted to the first stage of the fund which would allocate further resources under an 'Ideas Fund' to explore the feasibility of the route.

Following on from worrying future developments around our village within previous editions of Sharnford News this project/plan does not directly

affect Sharnford, but it will have traffic benefits around the village as the freight capacity will utilise the new line taking pressure off local roads such as the busy A5.

SHARNFORD TRAFFIC ACTION GROUP (STAG)

I received a text from a concerned resident on polling day. His wife showed him an article from the Leicester Mercury about speed cameras and the plans to take some down in the Fosse Villages. Imagine my surprise when I read the article and found out that Leicestershire County Council have been talking to the press before the Parish Council. Here are sections of the article:

Leicestershire's average speed cameras could be dismantled and moved to new roads

Seven speed traps have been operating since 2018 but some are catching far more drivers than others

Average speed cameras covering a number of Leicestershire roads could be dismantled and moved to other locations.

Leicestershire County Council has a network of

seven sets of cameras, and latest figures show that they caught more than 3100 drivers flouting speed limits over a five-month period up to the start of last month

Page 6 Please support our advertisers (April). However, some of the devices proved to be more prolific than others in issuing $\pounds 100$ penalties to offenders, who also got three points on their licences.

Now County Hall highways officials are deciding whether they are all located in the best locations or whether they could be moved to new roads where speeding traffic is an issue. Between October 1 last year and the start of April this year, the average speed cameras on the A6 in Oadby were triggered just nine times.

On the B4114 in Sharnford just 15 drivers were caught speeding in that time. The average speed cameras on Beacon Road in Woodhouse Eaves caught 35 speeders – just four more than the cameras on the B676 in Freeby. Larger numbers of drivers were caught



on the A50 in Groby where 510 penalties were issued. The cameras in Burton Road, Measham, caught 1,001 drivers and 1,531 fines were issued to people speeding through Walcote.

Councillor Trevor Pendleton, the county council's Conservative cabinet member for transport said "The cameras are popular. Most communities tell us they want them to deal with speeding traffic. But we do have to look at the numbers and decide and decide if they are all in the right places. Some will obviously stay where they are, but others can be moved. They have been in place since 2018 and we are reviewing them" Where do I begin? Well, Leicester Mercury, I am sure your photographer knew he was not on the outskirts of Walcote but on the edge of Sharnford!!! What is known as sloppy journalism.

Councillor Pendleton states they have to look at the numbers when deciding where the cameras should be. Cllr Pendleton, if your highways department had discussed the location of Sharnford's cameras we would have told them "THEY ARE IN THE WRONG PLACE", and we have continued to tell them. The number of 15 offenders were all caught travelling towards Leicester and not towards Coventry, Why? Because all traffic has to slow down to take the bend outside the Bricklayers. However, it can be argued that the cameras in Sharnford have done their job by keeping speeding figures low, whereas the cameras through Walcote have failed dismally by not slowing the traffic down at all.

I will be writing to Cllr Pendleton voicing my dismay at not being appraised of the council's plans before the press, and also being ignored by LCC Highways 'experts' over the last three years.

SHARNFORD HISTORY SHARNFORD'S VICTORIAN ENTREPRENEUR

A fresh-faced young **John Siddons Sanders** looks out from this early portrait in oils by an unknown artist. **John** was born in Sapcote, christened 21st March 1830 at St. Helens, Sharnford, the fourth eldest of seven born to **Allan** and **Elizabeth (Siddons) Sanders.**

From humble beginnings **John** was to make headway and was able to 'pull himself up by his boot straps' to become a well-known and respected prosperous villager.

Right - John Siddons Sanders (1830 - 1898)

Tracing the Sanders family back to 1709 in Crick, Northamptonshire, where records show that they were farmers, we fast forward to a Sharnford marriage in October 1776 between **Joseph Sanders** and **Mary Clay** - this being the first account of a Sanders living in our village. A first born to them was **Thomas** (1777-1845) who provides our next stepping stone, and who was to have an advantageous wedding on the 6th



June 1798 at St. Helens to village girl **Elizabeth Bray** (1771-1837). The Brays were the village windmill and bakery owners. **Thomas** and **Elizabeth Sanders** went on to have eleven children.

In the 1841 census for Sharnford **Thomas** is described as a farmer -but an earlier reference 'to him as being a cordwainer - an artisan in leatherwork. He was also adept at shoemaking for his family and other villagers. In 1822 he started to keep an account of his transactions in a ledger as he began to further supplement his income by venturing into the wholesaling of seeds and the transport needs of the local farming community. This was the start of the account ledgers of the Sanders family undertakings which stretch unbroken until 1900.

Into the scene now steps grandson **John Siddons Sanders** who we can assume is already working manually for grandfather **Thomas**, and soon became well versed in the workings of his grandfather's books for we see his first written account in a clear and fine handwriting - 'Jany 2 1844....Joseph Cotton; 800 of straw - 18s.' (meaning eight hundred weight of straw - 18 shillings). He is barely fourteen years old.

Thomas Sanders died 5 Jun: 1845 - leaving his greatest gift of a strong work ethic to his grandson, young **John** -who simply carried on with his grandfather's interests by wholesaling in seeds like 'taters' and,'pease' 'carage' of straw, sand, bricks etc. His teenage years 1845, to 1847 were quite lean in the ledgers and perhaps were supplemented in other ways not shown. But years 1848 & 1849 were the years when he really came out of the wilderness - for there are page after page of transactions for

Page 12 Please support our advertisers these years and beyond. He is clearly renting himself out for ploughing - '3 horses 1 days work - 11s.' Another good money spinner was 'drawing muck' at 11s. per day. It appears no job was to be overlooked. '6 cwt. of lime and carrage - 5s.6d.' collected from the limekilns at Hinckley canal wharf.



in Sharnford village while still undertaking his other lucrative ventures. From the Leicester Mercury Sat. 25th March 1854 we read'John Sanders, licensed victualler, New Inn, Sharnford, was charged by Supt. Deakins with knowingly permitting drunkenness in his house'.....

His account/ledger for 28th April 1853 shows examples of his prices (How about this, chaps!!!)....'best ale @ 3d. - rum @ 3d. - gin @ 3d.' He kept immaculate records of slate (credit) in his ledgers, due

from several of his favoured farming clientele.

Above - the New Inn, Sharnford - externally remained structurally unchanged from the 1850's to seen here - about 1900.

John Siddons Sanders dealings with the Inn diminish on the death of wife Harriett and completely disappear by February 1856. By the autumn of 1856/57, he appears to have diversified more towards haulage contracts- with many journeys recorded to '*Lester*', Nuneaton, Birmingham and Coventry. It was at Coventry that he was to meet future second wife 21-year-old **Ann Lord**.

Indeed, widower **John** needed a new wife - for he had two motherless young children to care for. He knew his intended **Ann Lord** from childhood, for although born

By 1850 John is clearly in a strong attractive financial position for he marries the 23-yearold village schoolmistress **Harriett Hardy** -3rd. October at St. Helen's church, Sharnford. Soon to be born to the couple are three children - **Thomas** (1852), **John** (1854) and **Elizabeth** (1855) but tragedy arrives for the family 7 Dec: 1855 as wife **Harriett** dies of tuberculosis to be followed 6 days later by 3month-old **Elizabeth** of atrophy - *a wasting away due to malnourishment.*

Left - the Sanders ledgers - which are complete from 1822 to 1900.

From April 1853 John became the new licensee of the New Inn (now the Bricklayers)



at Leire, she spent her early life at Sharnford - the daughter of Joseph and Martha Lord, one of the village wheelwrights. **Ann** was living now on affluent Warwick Row, Coventry - probably as a house servant - when they married in Jan-Feb-Mar: 1858 (unknown date) at the church of St. Michael in Coventry.

Above - the fire damaged remains of the wedding certificate for **John Siddons Sanders** and **Ann Lord.** The cathedral church of St. Michaels where they married was bombed to destruction during the Coventry Blitz of 14 Nov: 1940.

By the time of the village census of April 1861 - John and Ann are farming 58 acres of land in Sharnford with the addition of baby Joseph Allen (1860). By 1874 the family had grown by another 4 children - Allen (1867), Arthur (1869), Ernest (1872), and Elizabeth Siddons (1873) - plus the acreage was up a further 26 to 84 acres.

Through these intervening years **John** is again dealing in turnips, carrots, peas, *sweeds* (swedes), *mangolds* (mangols), *taters* (potatoes), wheat, barley, drawing muck, lime, bricks, sand and stone - renting out horse and cart, working horses, *stirk joisting 19s.6d.* (mating bull to cow) and loaning money at a 5% interest return rate.

Right - John's 15-year-old daughter, Elizabeth Siddons Sanders naughtily wrote this in her



father's ledger in 1889 - it reads 'elizabeth Sanders Born at sharnf'. and left -Elizabeth (1873-1927).

By 1870 - a new departure - a business in letting property for rent. There are at least four other rentals beside this



one - 'John Wood took the house and garden at 1s. 7d. per week'. On 21st October 1871 - we see a let at a bargain price 'Martha Tilley took the house at 9d. pw.'

Sometime between Sept: 1874 - Dec: 1875 **John Siddons Sanders** and his family left Sharnford village in a surprising move and went to live at Upper Parks farm, Markfield, (11-12 miles from Sharnford) which according to the 1881 census came with a 127 acreage. He was never to relinquish his hold on the old village for he appears to have visited weekly to collect rent etc. - and even expanded further his property holdings in Sharnford.

Life for **John** at Markfield was at a much slower pace - still dealing in seed, raising pigs and sheep, some haulage. As far back as 1854 (when licensee of the New Inn) **John Siddons Sanders** was dealing in *'chees'* in a small insignificant way e.g. *'Aug:28 - 2 pound chees - 1s. 11/2d*. But by 1880 a part of **John's** business was selling huge 25+lbs. cheeses to farmers and innkeepers in and around Markfield including the Old Star at Sharnford. Mrs. Lord, the licensee, receiving on many occasions 20+lbs. cheeses (and an occasional pig). A bumper year for **John** appears to be 1891 when a Mr. Wardle of Markfield received a total of 197 lbs. of cheese from him.

Another lucrative venture was gardening allotments - some 27 of which he parcelled out to the local residents of Markfield which the annual income for 1883 generated from this venture \pounds 9. 6s. 5½d. (equates today \pounds 765).

With consummate skill and ingenuity, John **Siddons Sanders** for 50 years provided an income and a comfortable life for his family. He died 26th December 1898 at Markfield aged 68 yrs. His wife **Ann (Lord) Sanders** died 6th May 1899 aged 62 yrs. also at Markfield.

It has been over 12 months of Covid-19 lockdown which has been a challenge for many in the village. We have had our share of deaths through Covid and other causes. Our thoughts and sympathies are with those

who have lost loved ones. Our two pubs have been hit hard but with improvisation and fortitude they have managed to come out of the dark tunnel into the light. It is up to us, their public, to stick to the rules and keep this virus, in all its variants, at bay.

There are a number of other challenges on the horizon with the Hinckley National Rail Freight Interchange (HNRFI) development entering the formal consultation stage. TRITAX, the developer, should have started consultation in March 2021 but they appear to be dragging their heels, I wonder why? At the time of writing (18th May), we are still waiting. After formal consultation TRITAX have to submit their formal application to the Planning Inspector in September 2021. This leaves us all (Leicestershire County Council, Blaby District Council, Hinckley & Bosworth Borough Council, and many Parish Councils) extraordinarily little time to formulate our reply to their proposals.

The other major challenge gave everyone concern when Blaby District Council issued their Blaby Local Plan Options Consultation Document. This document comprised of 66 pages with 32 questions and 14 downloadable attachments. Great if you are computer savvy but those who do not have internet access would have been disenfranchised if an abridged version had not appeared in the Sharnford News. Many were confused but it is worth mentioning that this is only a consultation with the final plan due to be adopted in August 2023. Plenty of time for residents to have their say.

Once adopted the Plan will set out a blueprint for how Blaby District will grow and change over the next 15 years and beyond. One major talking point was the potential for a 5000 house 'garden village' on the outskirts of Stoney Stanton and Sapcote. A possible control over these types of development may well come from the landslide YES vote for the Fosse Villages Neighbourhood Plan. This will enable Sharnford and other local parish councils to have their opinions considered when planning applications are submitted.

On more local matters, the Youth Club / Community Hall has been redecorated and gas central heating installed. A new fence and car park gate have been ordered and a new defibrillator will be fitted to the outside wall.

Over the year there have been problems caused by the thoughtless few who either live in Sharnford or pass through. Pollution of Soar Brook caused by some flushing wet wipes down a toilet which has been incorrectly connected to the storm water drain, or simply depositing their dog's poo straight into the river. Dogs allowed into the playground where the sign clearly states **NO DOGS ALLOWED**, or not picking up after their dog on The Park, Poors Meadow, Fosse Meadows footpath, and all pavements in-between. The Blaby dog warden has been informed and we are assured that fines will be handed out which could total several hundred pounds. Continuing with my moan if a dog waste bin is full then take the poo home. And, similarly, if the charity garment bins on the Bricklayer's car park are full take it back home. Sharnford Parish Council do not employ anyone to keep our village clean, it is up to residents to do that!

On a brighter note, we had our first go at a Christmas Light competition with some stunning displays. It is hoped that with more notice residents will get into the Christmas spirit and light up Sharnford for 2021.

At the financial year end (31/03/21) our accounts stood at a healthy £47,984. This was made up by funds from our council tax (£25000), a percentage of the cricket ground sale (£2250), a Leicestershire County Council Community Project Fund (£5000) which was used to improve footpaths in the area, and a large bequest from the estate of the late Helen Smart who lived on Park View.

The parish council has seen some changes, Karen Leck, our new clerk, started last October. Cllr Sue Stanley has left the council after six years and is already sadly missed. This now means we have two vacant councillor positions which should be filled. You will find an advert for these positions in this edition of Sharnford News.

Sharnford Scarecrow Festival 2021
