It is lovely to meet again in person after so many months of zoom services even though we aren't singing and are still socially distanced! We have All Age Worship on the second and fourth Sundays of each month, starting at 10am and all

Our Building

A detailed structural inspection has shown that, although the building itself is sound, there are repairs that need to be carried out in three phases over the next ten years. The building is grade 2 listed so some of the works, replacement of the windows, for example, will be costly to carry out to the required specification.

During lockdown some essential repairs have been carried out on the rear chimney and guttering to remedy a problem with water ingress. We will be hoping to get some grants towards the work, but we will also need to do a large amount of fundraising as our contribution to the cost. Fund-raising activities have been on hold for the last 18 months, thanks to the pandemic, but have now restarted in a small way with a book shed in Donkey Lane, Sapcote, next to the Donkey Shed - thanks to the Watts family. Lots of second-hand books are on sale so go and have a look. I can also recommend the produce on sale in the Donkey Shed, especially the Danish Pastries!

Reaching Out to Communities

We have been pleased to be a part of the Hope in the Summer scheme, in conjunction with St Helen's and the Sapcote Churches, over the school holidays and lots of meals have been cooked and delivered.

Collections of donated goods for the Hinckley Area Foodbank have continued throughout the pandemic so thank you to everyone who has contributed. If you would like to donate any goods please drop them into the church, chapel, Ladies group, or get in touch with me so that I can deliver them to the warehouse.

We have begun to collect and make items to fill shoeboxes full of gifts for our shoebox charity, Teams4U. The filled boxes will be distributed to deprived children in Eastern Europe at Christmas. As well as boxes for children, we were able to fill some home boxes with useful and decorative items that will be presented, primarily, to the lady of the house. We need lots of empty shoeboxes so we will be delighted if you can recycle yours by passing them on to us. SHARNFORD HISTORY

Sharnford's Old School Masters & Mistresses 1846-1939

Education. Education. The knowledge and development resulting from instruction. Prior to 1870 when sending a child to a school became compulsory, education bypassed the majority of Sharnford's youngster population during the 19th. century (as was in previous centuries).

A minority though -being sons and daughters of the landed and more affluent - could afford a tutor or governess or the child sent away to receive an education at a boarding school. One village family - the Harris's - sent their male children in



the 1820's to be boarded at the famous and prodigious Rugby grammar school. Closer to home was another opportunity, the Grammar school at Hinckley (which of course also had to be paid for) But by and large the sons and daughters of our agricultural labourers and frame work knitters went without any formal learning - until the commissioning of a purpose build national school in the village in 1846. Learning now was available - and that's if the parents could afford the cost of sending their child to school at 2d. or 3d. per diem.

Little known is the fact that Sharnford had a classical academy back then in 1846. (This will become the subject of a future piece in the SNews).) Here a child (who had moneyed parents) could be taught the 'dead' languages, higher mathematics and the sciences. It thrived - and due to lack of boarding space it moved to Ullesthorpe by 1848.

Just what was available for our working-class children prior to the building of the National School in 1846? Of course, there was the ubiquitous 'Dame school'. Of little or no educational value and were often little more than a day care facility for smaller children usually located at the home of a women 'teacher' for one or two pennies daily. Every village had one or more Dame school . From the Leicester Advertiser an article on the 15th April 1977 we read of our St. Helens church.....'in the early 1800's Sharnfords first school was held there, as the rector then was the schoolmaster, too.


The door in the tower by which the children entered has long since *been closed'*. Could this be the door in the tower by which the children entered, that has long been closed?



Although the late Jean Philps in her superb book "A Photographic History of Sharnford' cites the first named Master in 1846 at the new school as being Mr. W. Silvester, this is not quite the case - for William Gilder Silvester would have only been 15 years old in 1846. But William Silvester's story is interesting for indeed he taught later at Sharnford which I will relate a little further on. Jean also cites a Miss Murphy but I have been unable to place her or find her.

The earliest definitive evidence I can find for an early Sharnford teacher comes from Hager & Co's commercial directory of the county of Leicester, 1849. 'Elizabeth Wawman, schoolmistress -number of scholars 50'. Elizabeth was 26 years old in 1849 and was from Burlescombe, Devon. Along with her younger sister Caroline - who may have been her assistant teacher - their tenure here in Sharnford was short. Caroline married John Hissey, a joiner, in October 1849 and Elizabeth married Edward Wright, a miller of Monks Kirby, Warwickshire. in May 1850 - both here at Sharnford St. Helens. We see Elizabeth once more again (now Mrs. Wright) in the 1851 census with her 10-day old baby William visiting the next incumbent schoolmistress - Fanney Price. Fanney Price (24) was from Middlesex, London.

The census of 1851 for Sharnford shows another further two schoolmistresses in the village in that year - a Mrs. Sarah Jacques (29). Sarah, the wife of the village tailor, it is doubtful if she would had been teaching, for she had 5 children between the ages of one and ten by 1851. Likewise, with Mrs. Harriet Sanders *nee* Hardy, a Sharnford born girl, who bore three children by 1855- when she died of tuberculosis,

aged 28 years. She was married and buried St. at Helens. mentioned earlier I would relate the tale of William Gilder Silvester. He was next to follow on from Fanney Price. He was born in Lincoln in 1830, the son of a hatter and hosier, who taught here at Sharnford in

the early/middle 1850's. Prior to Sharnford William had arrived from another teaching post at Rearsby, Leicestershire. He was to meet here and fall in love with Miss Jane Jeffrey. Jane, born at Rugby, Warwickshire in 1838- who was a servant at Sharnford Rectory whose employer was the Rev.Henry Lacomb Watson - who married the couple at St. Helens church - 10 August 1858. It seems that William's and Jane's tenure was for a short time only - by 1860 they were at Oundle, Northants, where their first child was born. A year later the Silvester's were both teaching at Ropsley, Lincs. - Where I expect Jane was teaching sewing and needlework.

Drakes directory of 1861 and the 1861 census tells us of the latest newcomer to follow on from the Silvester's - bachelor Arthur William Howse (25), certified schoolmaster and accomplished organist of Birmingham. He met his future wife here, Mary Holyoak, yet another servant at Sharnford Rectory. The Rev. Watson married them at St. Helens -26 Dec: 1860. Mary, a daughter of a policeman, was orphaned at 2 years old and can be seen as a 13-year-old at the female orphanage in Southgate Street, Leicester, in the 1851 census. Assisting Mr. & Mrs. Howse was also Sharnford born Emma Hanes (1863 Whites Directory). Emma's tenure as assistant schoolmistress was too be short for she married William Tolton, a butcher, of Bruntingthorpe at St. Helens 14 July 1868.

The Howse family only stayed until 1874 when they moved to Rothley - and later to Castle Rising. Norfolk. I expect it was the pressures on such a large household in the small schoolhouse - there was eleven occupants including the servant - and that eventually forced them to depart. (see below the Sharnford 1871 census for the Howse family).

Left below - the playground and the rear of the school about 1953.


Our next incumbents in the schoolhouse we are informed by White's 1877 directory was Miss Josephine National Schoolmistress. Miss Josephine Rimmer was aged in 1877, a native of Radcliffe, Lancashire. She may have been appointed when the Howse's left in 1874 but we have no factual evidence of this. Josephine was joined by her other two sisters - Margaret (28) and Agnes (25), both 'Teachers of Elementary school'. Their mother, widow Sarah Rimmer (62) came too. Rimmers The remained incumbent until 1902 when all three sisters took retirement

together. Noteworthy is the class size for 1883 - 72 children. Nevertheless, the annual inspection and summary of the Inspector of Schools reveals 'the discipline, order and the instruction continue as excellent as ever'. The prevalence of appointing unmarried female teachers stems from the fact that male teachers for the same job were paid £40 a year more in 1880 (that £40 is equivalent to £3346 today). Because they were cheaper some School Boards were keen to employ women and sometimes a condition of appointment was that female teachers must resign on their marriage.

Following on the Rimmers, and directly from St. Stephens school, Maidstone, Kent in 1902, came the Barkers. Alfred Barker (49) schoolmaster, wife Louisa (49) school mistress and son Alfred George (12). The only service references to the Barkers comes from Kelly's 1904 and 1908 directories. By 1909 both Alfred and Louisa Barker took retirement. The 1911 census shows they retired to Kings Norton, Birmingham.

Our next incoming teachers in 1909 were Frederick (1878-1953) and Beatrice Emma (nee Ironmonger) Anderson (24) - Frederick a native of Workington, Cumberland - and Beatrice of Hinckley. They became our longest serving teachers at Sharnford -1909 to 1938. Frederick trained at Bede College, Durham, took 5 minor posts as assistant master (1899 to 1909) before coming headmaster at Sharnford in 1909.

Below- A page from the punishment book for 1926. The children's names are redacted for privacy. (Courtesy of Mrs. Sharon Boyd-Hope). Overlaid is the headmaster - Frederick Anderson. Punishment of this calibre certainly would not be countenanced today - mind you it did not do me any harm in my day!



As war clouds gather over Europe, our next headteacher was Mr. Pratt - who safely took our children through the war years 1939 - 1945. Sidney George T. Pratt was born at Sutton Elms, Broughton Astley, Leics. in 1902, son of a farmer, and whose teaching appointment prior to Sharnford was headmaster at Broughton Astley school. With him at Sharnford was wife Millicent and their two children, Margaret (1931) and Richard (1933).

Although I feel my listing of my Sharnford teachers 1846 - 1939 is substantially complete, I have no doubt that perhaps one or two have slipped through the net - here's one that nearly did - a Miss Pither. Her name appeared in Jean Phelp's pictorial history book. Jean cited 1872 for Miss Pither, which was when Mr. Howse taught, and this would make Miss Pither an assistant mistress. Research reveals this to be a Miss Matilda Pither, who was born 1850, a native of Shinfield, Berkshire. She would

have spent a short time here at Sharnford for she was not here in 1871. By 1881 Matilda Pither was Headmistress of her own school at Woolbeding, Sussex. She never married.

SHARNFORD PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Sharnford is starting to get back to normal, in other words the Sharnford Arms and Bricklayers are open, but don't get too complacent. Only in the last week there have been reports of residents, and staff at one of the pubs, having tested positive for Covid-19.

In my June Sharnford News report, I mentioned the Hinckley National Rail Freight Interchange (HNRFI) development and the developer Tritax missing the deadline for formal consultation. Well, nothing new has

happened. Tritax are still dragging their feet and the public consultation of 8 weeks duration is unlikely to commence until late September with the subsequent application to the Planning Inspector by the end of March 2022. Tritax have to give 2 weeks' notice in the local press, when the consultation is due to start. Tritax will be sending out literature to 40,000 properties within 3km of the proposed site. Unfortunately, this will not include Sharnford residents who live 4.35km (2.7 miles) from the site, even though we will bear the brunt of HGV traffic when the M69 is closed (which often happens). I will be making representation to the developer (with my district councillor hat on) for Sharnford residents to be included. Tritax and their planning agents (Framptons) proposed that statutory consultation would not include face to face events.

Blaby District Council and Hinckley & Bosworth Borough Council disagreed with this approach and asked for face to face events. The developer has now said that Face to Face will take place in addition to virtual Q&A sessions, video presentations and online social media. Finally, the developer cannot begin public consultation until Blaby DC and HBBC have been formally consulted. Any further details will be posted on Sharnford's website. BLABY DISTRICT COUNCIL

The first charging points in Blaby District Council's pay and display car parks are live and ready to use, as part of a project to make electric vehicle owning more accessible to residents.

Johns Court and Enderby Road car parks in Blaby are the first to charging points to go live, with eight bays in each car park exclusively reserved for EV car owners to charge their vehicle using the 7kW chargers installed.

The phased launch will also see charging points go live in Narborough, with six bays in Weavers Court and two bays in Leicester Road available for use in

the coming weeks.

£77,000 for the project came from the Office of Low Emission Vehicles for the 'On-Street Residential Charge Point Scheme'. The rest of the funding will come from EB Charging, who installed and will manage the charging points.

Local residents who cannot access a charging point are being encouraged to take

advantage of the new chargers, as well as for shoppers in Blaby and Narborough taking advantage to top up their electric vehicle. Charging will be offering the first two months of charging for free as part of the scheme. After the free period ends. charging will cost 30p per kW, with cashless payment made via the EΒ Charging app.

Dedicated charging bays will have a three-hour maximum stay from 8am-6pm Monday to Saturday, and cars parked in the bays must be plugged in to a charging point and displaying a valid parking ticket. Out of hours and Sunday parking is free, but the 30p per kW charge will apply at all times.

Councillor Les Phillimore, Portfolio Holder for Housing, Community and Environmental Services, said: "We are delighted to launch these charging points in our car parks as part of our ambition to make electric vehicle ownership as accessible to as many people as possible, as part of our Carbon Neutral Action Plan for the district. "We are hopeful that residents in Blaby and Narborough who can't access a charging point where they live will now have the opportunity to take the plunge into the world of electric vehicle ownership. "Our new EV charging points will also support local businesses by encouraging Electric Vehicle owners to shop and relax locally, and will be able to top-up their electric vehicles whilst they do."
