We've had a busy few months at Sharnford Primary and the children have settled back into full-time school life very well!

At the going down of the sun and in the morning, We will remember them" the Last Post was sounded by trumpeter Monica. A two minute silence was observed and the Reveille

SHARNFORD TRAFFIC ACTION GROUP - STAG



In 1989 Chris Rea released the song 'Road to Hell' about the M25. If he was releasing it today, in 2021, would it be retitled 'Road is Hell' and be about the A5, between High Cross and the M69 island?

Alberto Costa MP commented on his Facebook page on 13 May 2020 how delighted he was to see the recently completed safety improvements made to

the South Leicestershire stretch of the A5, at a cost of £3 million. This follows on from Alberto Costa, our MP for South Leicestershire, and Dr Luke Evans, the MP for Hinckley & Bosworth, meeting with the Roads Minister, Baroness Vere in January 2020. Alberto went on to state that "it goes without saying, the number of collisions and fatalities on this portion of road – especially at High Cross and Smockington Hollow – have been simply unacceptable, however Highways England have listened and acted upon local concerns. It's imperative that all using this road feel safe in doing so and I will of course be keeping a very close eye on the effectiveness of these improvements in the coming weeks and months".

Alberto has been true to his word and, at the time of writing, will be meeting with National Highways (formerly Highways England) to raise constituents concerns about

the safety of the A5 and the ongoing collisions, resulting in the sad loss of a person's life at the High Cross junction a few weeks ago.

Apart from the £3 million spent on road surface improvement what other ideas have National Highways had? None that I can think of, so what are the possible answers:



- 1. Close off central reservation gaps, stopping right turns from Smockington Hollow and High Cross junctions. This means all vehicles will have to turn left and travel up to the next island at Magna Park before coming back on themselves if they want to go north on the A5. This will increase A5 traffic through Wibtoft. Those travelling north on A5 will have to go to the DPD island and come back on themselves if they want to go to/through Sharnford.
- 2. Close of central reservation gap at Smockington Hollow, stopping right turns on A5. Change the High Cross junction to a signal controlled island. This will make it safer for A5 northbound traffic wishing to turn right towards

Claybrooke and Ullesthorpe but will make a 'rat-run' down Bumblebee Lane to Sharnford.

3. Speed cameras on A5 with a 40mph limit between DPD island and south of Wibtoft and get rid of central grass verges which are never cut on time. Something to do with wildlife but I suspect more to do with saving money.


VILLAGE FETE 2022

SHARNFORD HISTORY



In the most bizarre of circumstances'

The Mills family. Very little social history of the Mills family has come down to us through the years but with some careful research of village records I am able to add a few brushstrokes to an otherwise blank canvas. It would be very easy for me to say that the Mills family lived their lives within a cornucopia of rural idyll, wealth, health, cherub faced children etc., - but this was simply not the case. Tragedies were to come often and were never far away - which culminated at Christmas 1903 with the awful tragic accidental death of Thomas Mills whose death was recorded in the regional newspapers.

We begin our story at a convenient place with the marriage of Thomas Mills to Mary Ann Bates on the 28th.Dec:

Thomas Mills was christened Oct: 1849 at Claybrooke, the youngest of 5 of Thomas and Elizabeth (Hinks) Mills children of Claybrooke. Mary Ann Bates was christened in Leicester in May 1850 – daughter of parents James and Harriet (Billson) Bates - however our parish records show that parts of the Bates family were living in Sharnford

from at least 1841. Mary Ann's 11 year old brother, William was accidently drowned in a canal at Leicester and was buried here in Sharnford October 1867.

1893 Mary Ann Mills was to bear 15 children. Just imagine trying to such raise large family keeping them fed. clothed and roof above their heads on few iust а shillings a week, that father



Thomas Mills earned as a labourer.

To buy a house was completely beyond the reach of most working-class people leaving the only alternative to rent. Rural housing rental usually ranged between 3s. to 6s, (15p-30p) – this was a quarter to a third of the average working-class family's income. (statistics from Carol Adams *Ordinary Lives*). But we do know the cost of some of Sharnford's rents for we are fortunate to have the village entrepreneur, John Siddons Sanders contempory account books.

Here we read of some of his bargain house rentals in the village....'May 3rd, 1873 John Wood took the house and garden at 1s.7d. (8½p.) per week. He also rented 'July 1872 ...to Martha Tilley a house for 9d, (4½p.) per week. Martha lived here with her illegitimate daughter Frances. Martha bought quantities of beeswax from Sanders did she make a living making and selling candles? She was quite a resourceful lady for in the 1881 census showing she now is a tobacconist and seamstress - with the Mills family now living next door.

Living conditions for a large family in a small cottage in those days brought its share of problems. A Mr. Forbes recounts sleeping arrangements from his childhood in a 11 child family (from Maud Pember Reeves 'Round about a Pound a Week'). 'We had all the boys in one bed – three at the top and three at the bottom. My four sisters shared the other bed and that filled the room. There was a curtain across the middle of the room when my eldest sister got bigger.'

It was a family of eight Mills that was living at Sharnford having moved from Smockington – the only known authenticated prior address – in the winter of 1880/81. The Sharnford village school records for the year 1883, show that the 4 eldest Mills children began their schooling in Sharnford all at the same time – January 1881. Prior to this date the children attended Claybrooke school under the tutelage of schoolmaster Richard Mills. It is unclear as to whether the schoolmaster is related to our family.

Attendance figures for 1883 show the two elder girls was low. Harriet (13) attended 196 out of 417 days whilst Susan (9) 264 out of 417 days. Of course schooling had to be paid for back then in 1883 – a penny to four pence a week. Probably this cost influenced their low attendance (the fee was abolished in 1891) but most likely the majority of missing school days they would be helping mother with the laundry and nursing their younger siblings. This was to be quite **expected** of girls in those days and was not an unusual occurrence. There was no childhood for children especially for girls of yesteryear.

A Mrs. Layton reminisced in 'Memories of Seventy Years' of her early life in a large family'I was my mother's seventh child, and seven more were born after me – fourteen in all –which made my mother a perfect slave, generally speaking, she was either expecting a baby to be born or had one at the breast'.

When a new baby arrived we would here people ask 'has it come to stay? Grace Stokes, 'Between High Walls'.

Such was the high mortality of infant deaths this was а popular aside. By the 1880's many childhood diseases had still to he conquered and minor infections could prove fatal but the most common cause of death at

childbirth was 'puerperal' or childbed fever caused by hygiene ignorance of the attendant at the birth. Most babies were born at home and usually attended by the village or street 'handywoman', who was usually experienced but untrained in midwifery. The doctor was only called if there were complications and his fee was £1 10s. (£1.50p). (Carol Adams 'Ordinary Lives'). The doctor's fee would equate to over a week's wages for Thomas Mills.

Seven of the fifteen of Thomas and Mary Ann's children were to die in infancy/childhood –which was a higher proportion than the national average (1 in 4). The Mills deaths ranged from 3 weeks to 6 years. Below is a listing of the christenings and burial dates of the Mills children either at St. Peters, Claybrooke or St. Helens, Sharnford.

A modern Mills descendant recalls 'I remember my Nan telling me they had died of diphtheria during an epidemic and the family were still reeling from the tragedy when she (Nan) was still a little girl'. All the surviving eight children reached full adulthood and all found sweethearts and married – six of these in Sharnford, one at Stoney Stanton and one at Wymondham, Leicestershire.

Upon the Sharnford 1901 census we read of another cross for the family to bear –that mother Mary Ann Mills was 'paralyzed'- probably the result of a stroke. But there was one more tragic act to be played out – the death of father Thomas Mills in the most bizarre of circumstances at Christmas time 1903 – by being crushed under a steam traction engine.

At his inquest reported in the Hinckley Times 26 December 1903, witness George Grooms said both he and Thomas worked together as gardeners



at Croft House, Croft (George Grooms was later to be killed in action in France during WW1 in Oct:1914). On leaving work at 5 o'clock in the December darkness of 1903, they were cycling home to Sharnford along Field lane, George on a bicycle, Thomas on a tricycle - when they encountered a steam traction engine with some thrashing machines attached, going in the same direction. George and Thomas dismounted and walked past the illuminated traction engine on either side which was proceeding at 2 mph along the narrow lane (evidence given according to the flagman who was walking behind). Thomas bypassed the traction engine but did not allow enough space with

which to remount his tricycle and was subsequently drawn and caught up under the engine. Thomas died a short time later of his injuries. The Coroner in his summing up said there was no question of liability to the owner of the traction engine. The jury brought in a verdict of accidental death. Thomas Mills was buried at St.Helens church, Sharnford -21 December 1903 aged 55 yrs. His wife Mary Ann Mills, is also buried here - 23 May 1904 aged 54 yrs.


We held a successful bacon buttie morning at the end of September in aid of Macmillan Cancer support. We raised £505 for that worthy cause and many people met



SHARNFORD PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Following on from my last report in the Sharnford News, progress has/is being made both locally and within the wider Blaby District.

After many years the old, worn out tarmac path at St. Helen's church has been replaced, but not without some complications. Because the path level has been



District Council. The next phase will be the planting of 3,000 flower bulbs either side of the path.

You may have noticed changes at the Youth Club on Park View. The container has vanished, and the car park has been

heightened it caused rainwater to flow into the church during the recent deluge. Hopefully this has been rectified by clearing out the soakaway storm drains. The total cost for the new work was £14,700 but this was covered by Planning Obligation funds from Blaby



resurfaced. Repairs, which have been neglected over the last few years are gradually being rectified such as the roof leak, electrical issues, and the sighting of the combination boiler. These problems are the responsibility of the Youth Club and with the new trustees in place are now being addressed. In tandem with the repairs/improvements at the Youth Club the Parish Council are continuing with replacing the fencing on The Park and possibly the playground. This all links in with news that Blaby District Council are selling The Park to Sharnford Parish Council for the princely sum of £1. The condition of the sale is that the land will remain as a park in perpetuity, i.e., cannot be built upon and is for the free use of Sharnford residents (and their dogs).

Every month Sharnford Parish Council meets to discuss issues in the village, agree to pay bills and comment on local planning applications amongst other areas of interest. The minutes of these meetings can be found on the parish council website and also posted on noticeboards around the village. I wonder how many residents read these minutes because I was surprised to see that the planning application to

erect a 20 metre high telephone mast on Aston Lane only received 9 objections. These objections, I assume, came from those residents who received written notification from Blaby District Council. Only those residents living next door to the mast would have received letters, but the application was posted on the lamp post on Aston Lane and also publicised on Sharnford Parish Council Facebook page on 27 July. I am afraid the erection of this mast has now been approved and will be installed sometime in the next five years.

The River Soar is still suffering from pollution i.e., wet wipes and human faeces (in other words poo). It has been mentioned before that a resident(s) have incorrectly connected a toilet(s) to the storm water (gutter) pipe instead of the foul waste pipe. This storm water pipe runs under The Park from the Park View/Brookfield vicinity and can be seen



where it enters the river. Children play in the river, and this is causing a severe health hazard. Apart from the poo, after all the negative publicity, who still flushes wet wipes down the toilet? Severn Trent Water and the Environment Agency have been informed and may well come knocking on doors. If you think you may be the one at fault then inform the Parish Clerk and we may be able to help.

The proposed Hinckley National Rail Freight Interchange (HNRFI) is starting to progress. Public consultation is due to start early January 2022 with a submission to the Planning Inspectorate in March 2022. We are still waiting for the developer Tritax to publish in the local press when they will formally begin public consultation, they are obliged to give two weeks' notice. A meeting between all local interested parties, including Sharnford Parish Council, and our two Members of Parliament, Alberto Costa MP and Dr Luke Evans was held on Thursday 7th October. Not the best of meetings with our MP's unable to bring much to the table other than advise on employing a consultant to help with our objections to the development. Keep an eye on Facebook and noticeboards for any further information.

In the Blaby Local Plan options document there was a proposal to build 5000 houses on land west of Stoney Stanton. This worried many residents in all the local villages, but this was just an outline proposal by a developer group called Pegasus. This group represent the consortium of landowners/land promoters comprising Barwood Land, Parker Strategic Land Ltd, and Leicestershire County Council. It is worth noting that Leicestershire County Council own approximately 17% of the land being promoted for development. Pegasus arranged two workshops in October to gauge views, comments, and ideas for the site development. Day one was for invited key statutory consultee stakeholders, including county and district councillors and Blaby District officers. Day two was for focused engagement with invited members of the public,

local businesses, social enterprises, and Parish Councils. We are still awaiting feedback from Pegasus Group.

to draw up a new pattern of wards which will be formulated in readiness for district council elections in May 2023. Comments were invited and have been submitted by the deadline of 1st November 2021. This ended the first stage of consultation. The commission will now review all comments and make draft recommendations on 1st February 2022. Further consultation will then take place, ending 11th April 2022. Final recommendations will be published 5th July 2022.

Finally, on a personal note, in previous Sharnford News I have mentioned my local correspondent who has kept me informed on all matters Sharnford and Sapcote. Sadly, my local correspondent who was Stella Woodier, a good friend, has suddenly departed this life. Stella will be greatly missed by all who knew her, especially the new members of our community who Stella always made most welcome. Our thoughts are with Alan and Stella's family.
