CLOSING - SHARNFORD METHODIST CHURCH



It is with great sadness that the Methodist Church in Sharnford will be closing at the end of this year. The astronomical cost of necessary repairs to our listed building alongside a dwindling congregation mean that after much heart-searching and prayer, there is no alternative.

The church was built on land, known then as Allens orchard, and originally owned by Joshua Clarke. In 1827 the land was sold to the Methodists for £15.00 and the cost to build was £600.00, approximately £75,000 in today's value. The building has remained unaltered apart

from a small extension in the 1970s to facilitate a kitchen and toilet. In 1852 the land at the rear of the building for the burial ground was purchased for £10.00.

Our final service will be a carol service on Sunday 18th December at 3pm to which everyone is warmly invited. Our lay pastor is Mrs Anne Haddon. She can be contacted on 01455 617692

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SHARNFORD PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

While writing this report the much regretted 15m tall Telecom monopole on Aston Lane is being erected. At least the parish council and local businesses received plenty of notice, and it is being installed over the weekend. It is an eyesore, but I am sure it will eventually blend into the background, and we can now look forward to the promised benefits of the 5G network.

Warning, this may not be the end of work on this pole. The initial planning

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application was for a 20m high pole and several poles in Blaby District have been subject of further application to increase their height.

DAMAGE TO PLANTER

You will have noticed over the last few months that the planters in the village have been looking well-kept and colourful with many varieties of plants and flowers, thanks to willing water & weed volunteers, so it was

with shock and dismay that a car ploughed into and over the planter on the corner of Leicester Road and Aston Lane. The incident happened at about 3.00am on Sunday 6th November causing major damage to the planter. Needless to say, the driver and car were neither taxed nor insured!

In the photo you will see the police taking notes and also attempting to contact the owner. The driver was observed leaving the scene which is an offence, and he could be charged. Penalties include a fine or up to six months in prison. Luckily the original designer and builder of the planters, David Sewell, and yours truly were able to repair the planter with some minor

BOUNDARY COMMISSION

The Boundary Commission for England has begun its third and final consultation on the new proposed constituency boundaries. The consultation will run until the 5th December 2022.

The Commission has made significant changes to its initial proposals for the East Midlands area and is inviting the public to view and comment on their proposals on the consultation website www.bcereviews.org.uk. There are slight changes to the existing South Leicestershire constituency but these do not affect Sharnford or the surrounding villages.



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PLANNING

During the last three months there have been just a few planning applications mainly alterations to existing properties. The main changes are:

- Demolition of prefab offices and erection of new industrial unit The Works, Aston Lane
- The withdrawal of change of use of agricultural land to form an extension to existing haulage yard on Aston Lane – 58 objections were received by Blaby District Council
- 103 acre solar farm both sides of Lychgate Lane, Aston Flamville.
- The latest application is from Hinckley & Bosworth Borough Council 22/01037/OUT – Land opposite and south of Pumping Station, Aston Flamville Road, Burbage. This is for a major development on the border between H&BBC and Blaby District

Residential development of up to 343 dwellinas (Class C3), including provision public open space. associated infrastructure and all matters reserved except This access. outline application is from Jelson homes and will be either side



of Aston Flamville Road at the junction with Sapcote Road. An OUTLINE application does not give details of properties but is generally used to find out, at an early stage, whether or not a proposal is likely to be approved by the planning authority

Residents are always welcome to attend parish council meetings, held on the 3rd Thursday of every month, in Sharnford Evergreen Hall at 7:30 PM. At the meeting you are able to raise concerns and ideas to be discussed at future meetings by your council. 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HINCKLEY NATIONAL RAIL FREIGHT INTERCHANGE (HNRFI)

Blaby District Council and Sharnford Parish Council were informed by the Planning Inspectorate (PIN) that Tritax Symmetry (Hinckley) Ltd. would be submitting an application for an Order granting Development Consent for the HNRFI on or about Tuesday 22 November 2022. However, yet again, the date has now slipped and is expected in January 2023.

Once the PIN receives the formal application there is very little scope for change. It is at this point the PIN moves to the heart of six point process:-:

1. Pre-application

This is the stage we are currently at, having attended the various displays and submitted our objections to Tritax.

Before submitting an application, potential applicants have a statutory duty to carry out consultation on their proposals. The length of time taken to prepare and consult on a project will vary depending upon its scale and complexity. Responding to an applicant's Pre-application consultation is the best time to influence a project, whether you agree with it, disagree with it, or believe it could be improved. The Planning Inspectorate cannot consider representations about the merits of a proposed application at the Pre-application stage of the process.

2. Acceptance This should be January 2023

The Acceptance stage begins when an applicant submits an application for development consent to the Planning Inspectorate. There follows a period of up to 28 days (excluding the date of receipt of the application) for the Planning Inspectorate, on behalf of the Secretary of State, to decide whether or not the application meets the standards required to be accepted for examination.

3. Pre-examination

This is when Sharnford Parish Council will get involved by registering.

At this stage, the public will be able to register with the Planning Inspectorate to become an Interested Party by making a Relevant Representation. A Relevant Representation is a summary of a person's views on an application, made in writing. An Examining Authority is also appointed at the Pre-examination stage, and all Interested Parties will be invited to attend a Preliminary Meeting, run and chaired by the Examining Authority. Although there is no statutory timescale for this stage of the process, it usually takes approximately three months from the Applicant's formal notification and publicity of an accepted application.

4. Examination Sharnford and Sapcote may use the consultant we employed at the Preapplication stage.

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The Planning Inspectorate has up to six months to carry out the examination. During this stage Interested Parties who have registered by making a Relevant Representation are invited to provide more details of their views in writing. Careful consideration is given by the Examining Authority to all the important and relevant matters including the representations of all Interested Parties, any supporting evidence submitted and answers provided to the Examining Authority's questions set out in writing or posed at hearings.

5. Recommendation and Decision

The Secretary of State can overturn the recommendation from the PIN.

The Planning Inspectorate must prepare a report on the application to the relevant Secretary of State, including a recommendation, within three months of the close of the six month Examination stage. The relevant Secretary of State then has a further three months to make the decision on whether to grant or refuse development consent.

6. Post decision

Once a decision has been issued by the relevant Secretary of State, there is a six week period in which the decision may be challenged in the High Court. This process of legal challenge is known as Judicial Review.

From Acceptance to Post decision can take up to 18 months.



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SHARNFORD HISTORY

SHEEN - THE STORY OF TWO DISSOLUTE BROTHERS

Affectionately remembered, the late Pat Jordan 1928 to 2020, whose son Dave Jordan, kindly donated to the Sharnford News team some memorabilia of his mother's whilst disposing of her effects. This gesture was

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appreciated and has provided the tools for the team to work 'some magic' on and so produce these exceptional true tales.........of two dissolute Sheen brothers from Stoke Golding (Pat's mother-in-law was Florence Sheen who married Ernest Albert Jordan 27 Dec:1926 at Sharnford).

There was nothing remarkable that stood out about the family of Thomas and Mary Ann Sheen . Thomas, a frame work knitter, who fathered eight children, was from an old Stoke Golding family which we are able to trace back to a wedding of a Joseph Sheen and Eleanor Bradford in 1693 at Stoke Golding.

We turn our attention to the first of two of those eight children of Thomas and Mary Sheen - **Thomas Sheen** (bapt.17th Apr: 1817). Younger brother **Francis's** (bapt.19th Sept::1824)

It was teenage angst that caused the downfall of **Thomas** (Jnr) after an earlier altercation with a farmer at Stoke Golding - which started a downward irreversible path that had him commit the act of arson, which was then, punishable by death. Here pertinent extracts from the Leicester Mercury and Leicester Chronicle both dated Saturday 25 March 1837....'*Thomas Sheen 19*, and *Samuel Kirkland*

17, were charged with setting fire to a stubble stack and a straw stack belonging to Thomas Hall, farmer, of Stoke Golding, on the evening of 1st. March'......'important testimony was given by William Storer 19, who had been committed with the prisoners as an accomplice but who at the trial gave evidence against them.'....' Storer stated that Kirkland had the box of Lucifers (matches) and it was Sheen who set fire to the stackyard'. A 'Mr. Millner, addressed the jury at considerable length on behalf of the prisoners, but his observations were directed at the learned Judge, for mitigation of punishment'.....'Mr. Millner implored the jury to join with him, when delivering their verdict in recommending the unfortunate youths to mercy'.

The Judge in his summing up said....' some of your neighbours have given you good character. I am not willing to pass the extreme sentence of the law upon you; but I shall not have done my duty unless I sentence you to transport for life beyond the seas'.

So common sense prevailed, the sentence commuted, and the boys were to be transported for life to Australia. Just who was the goodly Mr. Millner, who spoke so passionately on their behalf? Was he some sort of court advocate or just a good Samaritan or even a neighbour of the Sheen's? Intriguing.

Below - from the Leicester Epiphany Assizes 1837-**Thomas Sheen J**nr (19) and **Samuel Kirkland** (17) - the original sentence of **death**.




The Leicester Herald 20 May 1837 advised us that'removal of nine convicts from Leicester Goal on Tuesday to a prison hulk at Chatham, Kent to await transportation'.

Of the named nine these are mentioned - Thomas Sheen and Samuel Kirkland.

Right- the prison hulk on the Chatham mudflats was to be the Fortitude - a decommissioned man of war - that served as an interim prison ship for prisoners waiting transportation from 1833 - 1844.



Below - Register of prisoners aboard the hulk *Fortitude* dated 5 July 1837. It confirms the date of sentence - 18 March -for arson and a whole life tariff and that



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Thomas could not read or write - that Samuel could read only. That they were both of 'good character and Respectful'.

Life aboard the *Fortitude* had to be endured from the end of May till 16 July 1837. It was vermin ridden, dark, foetid, airless with overcrowding between the 5 foot high old gun decks where it was impossible to stand up straight. Poor hygiene and sanitation was normal, with outbreaks of respiratory disease common place.

On 16th July 1837.....the **James Pattison** was made ready and sailed with 270 convicts .The ship was mastered by Captain Crommarty with a crew of 40. There were

30 guards, 4 women and 5 The children on board. Pattison was James commercial merchant\passenger ship which delighted the convicts. Luxury indeed! with space below decks to stand up straight! The ships surgeon was to receive 10s.6d. for each convict delivered to Port Jackson, N.S,W, Australia, alive. By exercising the felons on the top deck and providing regular better healthier food, the ship arrived in Port

Jackson after 101 days at sea



arriving 25 Oct: 1837. The surgeon delivered the total 270 convicts alive.

Above -The *James Pattison* - a painting on glass by Petrus Cornelis Weyts. On arrival at Port Jackson, New South Wales, - the prison authorities produced a convict indenture for each of the incoming new arrivals. **Thomas Sheen**, now 20 yrs. whose indenture is enlightening- for we now have a physical description of him. He was 5ft. 4¾ins. tall, of ruddy and much freckled complexion, red haired with blue eyes. He also had red whiskers.

After years of hard labour, **Thomas** earned release. He married Phoebe Ellen Perkins in 1851 at Macdonald River, N.S.W. and fathered 6 or more children -whose Christian names mirrored **Thomas's** siblings back home in Stoke Golding. **Thomas Sheen** died 28 Mar: 1891 at Parramatta, N.S.W. He never returned home.

' a terror of the neighbourhood'

Francis Sheen (bapt.19th Sept 1824). **Francis** was the youngest of the eight children of Thomas and Mary, and so the youngest brother to **Thomas**. He (**Francis**) appears in the 1841 census for Stoke Golding wrongly aged 15 yrs. but actually aged 17 yrs. Restless, even then, he joined the colours of the 47th. Lancashire Regiment -

possibly from their recruitment drive at Atherstone,- principally to get the Queens Shilling probably for drink. His army sojourn did not last long for he deserted and returned to Stoke Golding. The county newspapers between 1845 and 1847 variously described Francis Sheen -'a rogue, a thief, a vagabond, a terror of the neighbourhood. It was only when he was jailed in Oct.1847 prior to deportation that his escapades came to an end.

We first see of **Francis** in the newspapers, here in the *Leicester Mercury*, Sat. 27th Sept 1845. The mentioning of Stockport, Lancashire, that was home to the ersteth, rector of Sapcote, in aid of this school, when

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47th.Regiment.

The petty Sessions were at Hincklevbut do read here of Francis's escape from the lockup.

Interestingly, mentioned at the end of the piece, is the illegal milking of a cow Stoke at Golding belonging farmer to Thomas Hall....it was the farmer that same Frances's brother Thomas burned down the straw stacks in 1837!

With this escape from Hinckley police the station, Francis became something of á cause

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célébrité locally - much to the chagrin of Superintendent Goodall, senior police officer at Hinckley.

(The whole police force of Hinckley in 1845 comprised one superintendent, one sergeant and 3 constables). Considering that drunkenness was rife in Hinckley back then - mostly due to out of work framework knitters - and about 40 alehouses - it was an totally inadequate force.

Although a new police station was built in 1842/3, it was far too small. Francis's escape from his cell could have been from the small old prison in Stockwell Head still in use in 1847. The new police station was so small that only the Superintendent could live in - and that he, his wife and four children had to share the one and only bedroom.

Right - a policeman of the 1840's - often called Peeler's (after Robert Peel), but they preferred to be called 'constable'.

But **Francis** went on to excel himself with yet another escape which became a sensation. Fairly or unfairly, now anything stolen or broken into within the Hinckley area became attributed to **Francis**- even though he was locked away in a Leicester Bridewell (jail) in 1847. I am able to find 13 references to **Francis** in the Leicester newspapers in the two years 1845 - 1847.

Leicester Journal 5 Mar: 1847....'Thursday 4 March 1847, Leicester Quarter Sessions'....'Francis Sheen (22), was charged with stealing a watch, belonging to Thomas Bodycoat; of Stoke Golding'..... Sentenced to ten year transportation'.



Leicester Mercury 20 Mar:1847.....Escape of prisoner from County Goal....On the night of Wednesday last, a prisoner named Francis Sheen, alias Henry Miles of Stoke Golding, effected his escape from the County Goal'....'it appears that by some means he had secreted a knife in his cell, by which he took out a panel from the door. Then making his escape along the corridor into the airing-yard, he scaled the walls by means of blankets'......He is twenty-two years old, 5ft. 6¼ ins. high, with light hair, brown whiskers, grey eyes, and a red scar on his throat; he was dressed in drab jacket and trousers, white cotton shirt, and a blue neckerchief'.

Leicester Chronicle 27 Mar: 1847...Recapture of Sheen....'the County Police after hearing information that **Sheen** the escaped convict was in the neighbourhood of Stoke Golding; with a view to paying a visit to a woman called Mary Mann, with whom he had previously cohabited. Supt.Goodhall obtained the assistance of the principal part of the male population of the village, and went in pursuit of **Sheen.'**....'after a sharp run over three or four fields they succeeded in apprehending him'.....'he was afterwards conveyed in a fly to Leicester, and safely lodged in goal once again'. Which Leicester goal it was I am not able to find.

From March 1847 until he was transported to Van Diemans Land (Tasmania) in August 1850, **Francis Sheen** was lost somewhere in the penal system. It was unfortunate that this was an era of oppressive punishment (1846-1865) with inhumane enforced solitude by cellular isolation and by a series of measures designed to prevent convict to convict recognition or talking. Further measures included stalled chapels, individual exercise or 'airing yards', and with caps cum face masks. Madness and suicides were commonplace.

Right - prisoner exercise in the 'airing yard'. Note the face masks. That little escapade of escaping from the jail earned Francis another year onto his tariff making it now totalling 11 years.

On 23rd Aug: 1850......this was the departure date of the *Rodney* from Portland (Dorset) to Hobart town,



Van Diemen's Land. The ships master was Alexander McLean and **Francis** was one of 312 convicts on board. There were 4 deaths on board during the voyage.. The

Rodney arrived at its destination 27 Nov: 1850.

Here (right) from the register of new in arrivals Van Dieman's Land (Tasmania) Frances Sheen. The date of his last trial at Leicester -29 July 1847 is nicely shown and his tariff of 11 vears.

Francis must have knuckled down and impressed the Van Dieman's Land prison authorities for he was pardoned after a combined imprisonment of 5

years + 4 mth. Release date Dec: 1852. A free man at last - but there was strings of probation attached.

Francis approached the prison commisioners for permisssion to marry and gained a Ticket of Leave 10 May: 1853. His intended was 16 year old **Ann Rochford** (1837 - 1867).

The wedding certificate **Below** - the date 20th June 1853 at St. Josephs's Catholic church, Hobart. **Francis** gives a wrong age of 23 when he was actually 30 years of age. His profession is shown as a sawyer. Was he still cocking-a-snook at authority? A female child Frances Sheen was born 11th Sept: 1855 at Hobart. Three other children were born to **Francis** and **Ann** - at least two of the three were born in N.S.W. Australia. **Francis Sheen** died 12th Mar: 1884 at Lismore, N.S.W. - I wonder if the two brothers ever met up again.

SHARNFORD - HEDGEHOG UPDATE

Have you had any hedgehogs in your garden this year?

We have had them now for several years, although within their accepted life span (of about 5 years we are told) they can't be the same ones!

So what has been happening? They were very busy when they came out of hibernation, although they did not use the hog boxes, we provided for them, over last winter. We have no idea why not, however, they regularly ate the food left out for them, but they can be fussy.....

They are meat eaters, so in the past have tried different varieties and the one that always eaten is Spikes **semi-moist** with a light sprinkling of meal worms. We never leave meaty cat food out, since all the local felines eat it before the hogs have a chance!

We noticed a difference in habits during the two heat waves this summer. They didn't bother with the food - despite us digging a small patch of hard ground for them to forage for worms and beetles. They certainly appreciated the ground bird bath, since they drank well or sat in it, to cool down!!

We haven't seen any hoglets, but our neighbours have. We seem to see the same three adults, but not usually together. So how can we tell the difference, on our night camera?? One has a small paler patch of spines on his/her back. Another developed a limp, and tended to drag his rear right leg. We haven't been able to catch him/her, but he/she is moving better when last seen. And the 3rd is just as depicted on all hog illustrations. A classic looking hedgehog.

We are sure they will be hibernating soon, as the weather is changing and we have seen more activity overnight. In each hog house, we put a small amount of hay (never straw), gathered locally, earlier in the year, the hogs can then be seen collecting fallen leaves.

We have three homes for these little creatures, two given to us and one made, now a few years ago from a plan on Google! Also there are two log and brash piles in a quiet spot, to provide shelter during the day.

So if you have the time and space, have a think about encouraging this wildlife into your garden. These animals can travel up to 2 miles each night, so access to other gardens and fields is vital. Perhaps you are able to create a 'hedgehog highway', by making an opening in any fencing. It will be appreciated by them and us too, next year. Much of our knowledge is learned from the internet, although Kibworth Wildlife Centre are helpful too. We understand they have been inundated with hogs this Autumn, so if you think you have a space where you can over-winter one, please contact them 07951 285366 or www.leicesterwildlifehospital.org

Finally, you may know that if you see a hedgehog in daylight hours, it's in trouble.... So contact the wildlife centre for advice.
