# SHARNFORD BUS SERVICE – USE IT OR LOSE IT



In October 2022 saw the removal of our only regular bus service to Leicester and Hinckley. Aviva suddenly informed us that the X55 bus service was to be removed because of lack of use and the removal of subsidy from Leicestershire County Council. To keep going Aviva required £180,000 in subsidy which according to LCC is unsustainable.

The service has been replaced by Fox Connect, a new minibus service which will connect rural villages in the south of Leicestershire. The FoxConnect service is a new 'demand responsive transport service' which will provide a lifeline to small villages which have borne the brunt of transport cuts in recent years.

Unfortunately, whilst welcome, the new service does not replace the X55 bus for school children needing to get to Hastings High School in Burbage. Leicestershire County Council have had to lay on school specific transport for the 11-16 year old Sharnford children as per Government policy, but not for all of them! Four children living in the north of our small village are not catered for, leaving them unable to use school transport to Hastings High School. Leicestershire County Council have stated that it is up to the parents to get pupils to school, even though the now provided school bus goes past their home(s) with spare seats! Our MP Alberto Costa has now got involved at the request of the affected families and, with assistance from our County and District councillors will, hopefully get County Hall to see sense for these children and future high school children of Sharnford.

There are three minibuses available with Fox Connect. To book journeys, either via their app or by calling, to provide ondemand transport services between Leicester and <u>Hinckley</u>. The scheme will be a three-year trial and funded with £1.3 million from the Department for Transport's Rural Mobility Fund. In October the number of journeys originating from the Stanton & Flamville Villages was:

Aston Flamville 7	
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- Sapcote 269
- Sharnford 59
- Stoney Stanton 277

At the end of the funded trial, if the service is not profitable, we could lose it.



# SHARNFORD SICK AND DIVIDEND FUND

Another successful year for the Sharnford Sick and Dividend Fund, we were once again able to distribute around 120 festive food bags just before Christmas 2022. This was made possible by many local businesses, local supermarkets and individuals donating raffle prizes that amounted to around 40. The prize draw is only held once a year, but it is a yearlong process to procure prizes for next Christmas and is reliant on the generosity of individuals who have supported us for many years.

Special thanks goes to Narborough Co-op who at very short notice procured a superb Christmas hamper, this went some way to make up for the loss of prizes due to the post-strike as our letters asking for donations were not received.

A superb day for the distribution, made possible by a handful of dedicated volunteers with everything running smoothly. Special thanks goes out to the people that made the ticket sales, the support for buying tickets from the local businesses and our business contacts can only be described as fantastic - selling tickets is probably the hardest job of all, closely followed by the purchase of all the goodies required for the bags. We had a record number of thank you letters and cards, these will spur us on for this year's Christmas raffle and distribution - it may seem a long way off but it soon comes around. Support from the Parish Council and anonymous donors helped swell the coffers and helped cover the increased costs of this year's distribution.

"The Old Custom of Plough Monday still prevails, like a great many old popular tales, Plough Bullocks dressed in ribbon, a gaudy show, in a long procession shouting as they go - "HIGHAM ON THE HILL, STOKE IN THE VALE, WYKEN FOR BUTTERMILK, HINCKLEY FOR ALE!" [*Richard Fowlkes, Elmesthorpe 1811.*]

In 1986, Tony Ashley, revived the old Leicestershire customs from Plough Monday having researched and collected the

information from local texts and older residents of the area who still remembered the tradition from their parents' and grandparents' tales. Before 1986, the tradition is last recorded around the turn of the century in Sapcote.

In the past, on the first Monday after Twelfth night – Plough Monday – the plough was prepared for the new season, dressed in gaudy ribbons and taken in procession round the villages. Today, with work commitments making this difficult, the Hinckley Bullockers tour the villages on the nearest Saturday



to Plough Monday, having dressed the plough on the Friday evening.



The men pulling the plough 'raddled' their faces (ie used red face make up) and were known as Plough Bullocks. They also performed molly dances peculiar to the eastern counties. All of this tradition has been kept with the men meeting early on the Saturday at The Bricklayers in Sharnford to apply the red face make up and partake of an excellent breakfast provided by the pub. Then, following tradition, the plough stops at

various local pubs in Sapcote, and Stoney Stanton as well as a few private houses in order to dance and sing and drink. In the past, if neither drink nor cash were forthcoming from landlords, the drive was ploughed up – not something currently

done, you'll be pleased to note. Despite rather wet weather, the Hinckley Bullockers were out again this January, dancing round the villages having practised on Tuesday evenings during late November and December.

Further practices will be on December 5th, 12th, 19<sup>th</sup> and January 4<sup>th</sup> with the day itself taking place on January 6<sup>th</sup> 2024.



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#### SHARNFORD PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

#### JUBILEE CUP

Nominations for the Jubilee Cup are invited from people living in Sharnford Parish and also all nominees must live in Sharnford Parish. The Jubilee Cup is awarded annually to anyone or group who has provided or been involved in a service or project that has benefitted the residents or Parish of Sharnford. The closing date for nominations **is Sunday May 7<sup>th</sup> 2023**. Sealed nominations can be given to any member of the Parish Council or alternatively you can present your nomination at a Parish Council meeting before this date. This gives the Parish Council just over a month to decide the award prior to its presentation at the village fete on June 11th.

#### HINCKLEY NATIONAL RAIL FREIGHT INTERCHANGE

After much delay the developers Tritax Symmetry submitted their application for the Hinckley National Rail Freight Interchange (HNRFI) to the Planning Inspectorate on Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> February. Blaby District Council then had until 21<sup>st</sup> February to comment on whether it believes the developer's consultation on the plans was adequate. The Planning Inspectorate will then have until Monday 06 March to decide whether to accept the application. If the application is accepted, the Planning Inspectorate will begin assessing the developer's plans. At the same time, if the application is accepted for examination the submission documents will be made available to members of the public on the Planning Inspectorate's website:

The period when members of the public can register as interested parties usually begins several weeks after an application is accepted.

There will be a six-month long examination phase, including hearings, towards the end of the year, and a decision is expected by the middle of 2024.

The scheme, earmarked for 440 acres of land between the M69 and the Leicester to Birmingham railway line, falls mainly within the boundary of Blaby District Council, south-west of Elmesthorpe village, but will also affect Stoney Stanton, Sapcote, Aston Flamville, Burbage, and ultimately Sharnford, where all roads lead to the B4114.

The scheme is of such scale and national importance that the application for its development will be ultimately decided by the Secretary of State for Transport.

Blaby District Council has no power to veto the project but is instead a statutory consultee in the process.

#### MAY 4<sup>TH</sup> ELECTIONS

On Thursday May 4<sup>th</sup> you will be able to exercise your democratic right and vote for your next District and Parish Councillors. Whoever is elected will represent you for the next 4 years.

Sharnford Parish Council is currently up to quota with seven Councillors.

On the day of the election your district ward will change name and member parishes. Currently we are in Stanton & Flamville Ward which comprises of Aston Flamville, Sapcote, Sharnford, Stoney Stanton, and Wigston Parva, with three District



Councillors. After the latest Boundary Commission consultation we will belong to the new District Ward of Fosse Highcross with two District Councillors, comprising of Aston Flamville, Elmesthorpe, Sapcote. Sharnford. and Wigston Parva. The name Fosse Highcross has been chosen to represent the Fosseway which runs through the district and the High Cross depicting the monument. Roman centre of Britannia, at the southernmost tip of the new ward. Elections in our parish



and ward will only take place if there are more candidates than places.

Please remember that Parish and District Councillors are there to represent you on **Local** issues and not central government issues. For central government we are represented by our Member of Parliament Alberto Costa.

# If you wish to vote in person on the day at the polling station you must bring photo identification.

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An extensive list of acceptable forms of ID is available, including passports, driving licences, bus passes and blue badges. See the Electoral Commission website to check which forms of photo ID are acceptable at polling stations.

The ID does not even necessarily have to be in date – as long as the photo still looks like the resident who wants to use it and the name on the ID is the same name used to register to vote.

However, only original versions of the ID will be accepted, photocopies or images will not be allowed in order to cast a vote.

Voters who do not have an accepted form of ID can apply for a free 'voter authority certificate' – a VAC – to allow them to cast their ballot.

#### Postal Votes do not require photo I/D

Postal voting is available if you cannot attend a polling station on Election Day or if you find it more convenient. Anyone aged 18 or over can apply for a postal vote and you do not need a reason to vote by post. You can apply to vote by post for a particular election, for a set time or all future elections. Apply by downloading and printing the Postal vote application on the Blaby District Council website.

#### POLLUTION IN RIVER SOAR

I have commented over the last four years about pollution in the River Soar caused by the misconnection of waste pipes to the storm water pipe which directs rain water from homes into the river. This is most noticeable when it rains and wet wipes are seen in the river. At long last the connection fault has been rectified by LCC Highways department but wet wipes should be disposed of in the refuse bin and not flushed down the toilet.

# SAFETY DRAINAGE MAINTENACE WORKS - A5 Smockington Hollow

We will be carrying out essential drainage maintenance works to the A5 at Smockington Hollow

During our scheme of work, we will:

- clear all vegetation
- repair drainage system, installation of a new headwall and safety barrier
- reinstate verge

#### When will the work take place?

This work has now been re-scheduled with revised dates now due to start on 8<sup>th</sup> March 2023 and is scheduled for completion by end of April 2023. Please note that all our planned roadworks may be subject to change due to weather conditions or unforeseen circumstances.

#### How will the work affect traffic?





There is a main hall, with tables and chairs, a small meeting room, toilets, including disabled, stage and a fully fitted kitchen with crockery and cutlery, cooker for reheating (but not for full cooking) £12 per hour for casual hire Regular Groups enjoy a reduction in rates Charity events are discretionary but usually village charity events are free or by donation We now have a digital projector and screen. These can be bired for the showing of films

We now have a digital projector and screen. These can be hired for the showing of films etc at a fee of £10 per session. All licences are in place for the showing of films.

To keep our programme for these works as short as possible and to minimise disruption to the local community, residents, businesses, and road users we will work under full carriageway overnight closures between **8pm** and **6am**, **Monday** to **Friday**. Some elements of the work will require **full weekend** closures from **8pm Friday** to **6am Monday** and these have been programmed as follows;

- Friday 17 March to Monday 20 March 2023
- Friday 24 March to Monday 27 March 2023
- Friday 31 March to Monday 3 April 2023

We will also have in place a contingency midweek closure planned for **Tuesday 2 May to Thursday 4 May 2023** to cover any unforeseen circumstances due to weather or clashes on the network.

There will be a temporary speed limit for the duration of the whole scheme from 50mph to 40mph. Also all Lay by's within the work extents will be closed 24/7.

During these closures fully signed diversion routes will be in place, which have been agreed with the Local Authority.

#### How will the work affect traffic?

During these closures, fully signed diversion routes will be in place, which have been agreed with the local authority. All carriageways and slip roads will be open as usual outside of our working hours.

We apologise for any inconvenience caused and will do our very best to complete the work as quickly as possible, keeping disturbances and noise to a minimum.

# SHARNFORD WESLEYAN METHODIST CHAPEL

The shock of the chapel closing was quite profound. The trustees have deemed that the chapel should be closed as a place of worship, due to falling attendance numbers and the need for imperative and necessary repairs. Truly, a corner stone of the village community that survived almost 200 years, has met with the 21st. century.

My first thoughts were when I heard of the village chapel closure - could not the cost of the repairs to the building be achieved through crowd funding? Social media is a



powerful tool. It is such a beautiful old building - one of the very few old buildings left in our village. Those wooden round headed windows are distinctive with their Y tracery - they would have to be artisan made to suit each situation, this being Grade 11 listed building.

A walk round the exterior of the building shows no sign of blocked doors or windows - the enormous 2 per side windows were to let in as much light in as possible with the building showing all the originality of when it was first built. Its attractive red brick facade is a delight, complete with an 1827 date tablet above the central door. Unusually for a Wesleyan chapel, the chapel has a burial ground, but how old is the Chapel....?

Some uncertainty abounds as to the chapel's age and humble beginnings but perhaps there is a seed of truth in either one of the following stories. The first one

from G.W. Oxley - who cites from the National Archives 1851 Ecclesiastical census (Hinckley Union) about Sharnford chapel)..... 'a building of which nothing is known was in use from 1812 to 1827. It closed when the new chapel opened.' Also from the same Hinckley Union Ecclesiastical census another writer reports that the congregation began meeting in a private house in 1795 in the village, and that they later then occupied a building (possibly on the same site), from 1812 to 1827. At that point the new chapel was built which had free seating for 186 people. The mentioning of free seating was in contrast to Sharnford's St. Helens church when at that time you paid to be seated in a pew with its own door. (A show of status and to keep the draughts out perhaps ?). The poorer people sat free of charge in the centre of the aisle.

The Rev. H. W. Stephenson in his treatise 'Methodism in Sharnford' wrote that there was no meeting house or chapel in Sharnford village prior to 1827, although a Methodist Society was formed there about 1791. The present Methodist Chapel was built at a cost of £600 (£44,332 today) and opened for public worship in 1827. Previous to this, it is believed the Sharnford Society met for worship at Frolesworth, where it is known services were regularly held in the house of Michael Clayton. Here again another line for thought from the Methodist Magazine of 1835 ..... from an obituary dated June 28th, 1835. ....'At Burbage, in the Hinckley Circuit, aged sixty one years of age, obtained the knowledge of salvation by the forgiveness of sins. A small society was about this time, formed at Sharnford the place of his residence. The people were few and despised, but he gladly united himself with them; and in the

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Page 15 Please support our advertisers midst of obloquy and persecution continued steadfast. At Sharnford, and subsequently at Burbage, he discharged the office of Class Leader with fidelity and success, during a period of thirty four years continuing in office till he was called to his reward......

\*\*\* William Hurst was born in Sharnford in 1774, to become one of Sharnford's chapel's first Leaders. He was the eldest of ten children of



Benjamin and Alice (Marvin) Hurst. All ten children were christened in the Anglican faith at St. Helens church. William married Catherine 'Kitty' Merry 6 Nov: 1802 at St. Marys church, Hinckley. They appear to have had only one child, Mary, born in 1812 at Burbage. It would seem that the Hurst family remained in Sharnford till at least 1798 when the family upped and moved to Burbage. The father, Benjamin died there in 1817, with his wife, Alice, dying there four years later.

Above we saw it was not all plain sailing in Sharnford in the early days for nonconformists - but that was small change compared to Sapcote's trials and tribulations - this dates from around 1803...from an obituary in the Methodist Magazine of

'Mr. Thomas Hinks of Sapcote....had lived without God until 1795. About this time a small society was formed. The late Mr. Joseph Suffolk was the Leader, and on his periodical visits, encountered no small annoyance and abuse. Persecution soon began to rage with violence. A large drum was purchased; and a mob was collected to follow the Preacher when he made his appearance. Numerous acts of violence put the society in no little danger. Several of the farmers encouraged these proceedings, ordering the public houses to be opened for the indulgence of the persecutors. In the end the preaching in the barn was given up; as no one in the village durst open his house, the service was discontinued for about 7 years. During this interval, our late friend and the rest of the society attended the preaching in Sharnford'.

In 1815 the Hinckley Methodist Circuit recorded that there was 18 members in the Sharnford Society. Thomas Hackett (Leader), his wife Mary Ball (married St. Helens 12 Oct: 1791), Thomas and Jane Corbey,(married St. Helens 12 Oct: 1796) Isaac Aldridge (married Eliz. Weaver at St. Helens 9 Aug: 1789), William Welton, Mary Heath (she lived at Smockington), Thomas Jackson (labourer), Joseph Tilley (frame work knitter), Mary Hirons, Elizabeth Ward, Elizabeth Haines (wife of village shoemaker), Nathaniel and Ann Crane (tailor), Jane Haines (1745-1821), Elizabeth Hackett and Mary Elliott. (Bold writing from this authors notes).

The churchyard of Sharnford's chapel is almost unique for I don't think there is another in the whole of the Hinckley Circuit. It came about in a most distressing waywith the death of 18 year old villager Joseph Clarke on 22 Dec: 1851, apparently by his own hand. The new incomer Rector of the village St. Helens Anglican church, the Rev. Henry Lacon-Watson (who was inducted 14 Dec: 1850), refused the burial of poor Joseph in the consecrated grounds of his church. The anguish of Joseph parents must have been palpable. "Where do you bury our boy?". Being part of the Methodist Community, the parents with an arrangement of the chapel, it was decided that he should be buried in the chapel forecourt almost against the front door. The following year, 1852, Joseph's parents, Joshua and Susannah Clarke bought and donated a piece of land to the rear of the chapel to be designated a future burial ground. Was it bought in mind to be the final resting place for Joseph? It never happened.

The first burial in the new churchyard at the rear of the chapel was Ann Thacker, aged 17 years, 22 May 1852. She was the daughter of Richard and Alice Thacker.

And finally, attendance figures for Sharnford Chapel - from the ecclesiastical returns of the Hinckley Union for 1851......' On Sunday 30 March 1851 there were two services, one in the morning and one in the evening which attracted congregations of 96 and 120 respectively. The Sunday school met in a room adjoining the Chapel had 82 scholars in the morning and 40 in the evening. The 1851 census for Sharnford gives the village a population of 611.

The latest official modern attendance Sharnford Chapel figures we have are for 2017 - was for a membership of 11, the average all week with all ages attending - 10.
