#### SHARNFORD HISTORY SHARNFORDS P.O.WS

I took this photograph of a tree in Sharnford parish some years ago. Carved into the bark quite clearly is 'H.Witter. P.o.W. 1945'. I am not at liberty to tell you where this



tree is for fear of vandalism - but I had a dream that I might one day reunite his family once more with the tree.

Wanting to find out more about H. Witter, I contacted the German Red Cross but was told that would be impossible at that time unless I was a relative. End of story? Not quite. Since I first approached the German Red Cross, things have changed quite considerably. Since most of the old soldiers have passed away (now 75+ years since the end of war), access to the old

prisoner of war and repatriation records are now available – no doubt they realised that there was a huge commercial interest here. Unfortunately the inflated premium was so high that I was not prepared to pay it.

Is this the end of the H. Witter story? - Perhaps not - for I have written to a German newspaper hoping that they will take up the story. They have acknowledged receipt of it.

Land Army girl Rose Jarvis later Pratt recalled 'We were told by Mr. Barker that we were not to speak to the Germans'. Mr. Barker was the estate manager of the Shade, Sharnford. Four Land Army girls lived in at the Shade, mostly employed in the 2 dairies which were large. 'Mind you' says Rose, 'the Italian P.O.Ws. were always friendly, smiling and singing'

1948 and spent their remaining years together here in Sharnford.

Rose's lucid wartime memories -'the best time of my life' - recalls that the German's came from Enderby P.O.W.camp and that they were dropped off in the morning and collected again in the evening. There was no guard. Direction and job allocation tasks was given out by Mr. Barker, the estate manager.

Their duties were heavy manual - digging out tree stumps, clearing




It would seem that P.O.W's were used at selected farms only and these appear to be only Cooperative ones. I have no idea why The Shade was special; it being a government initiative site - WARAG

ditches, stone picking fields. There was no known fraternisation between the P.O.W's and the Land Army girls. - Well, perhaps the Italians when they came and Mr Barker was not about!



building water culverts, brick layering etc.

Above - Enderby P.O.W. camp. First used to house Americans but after D Day

1944 became a holding tank for Germans and others captured in France. The Germans were then sent onwards from Enderby to Stoughton P.O.W. camp in 1946/7 which was to centralise and house eventually over 2,000. Germans. Enderby was then used for D.P's (Displaced Persons) from Eastern European countries including Ukraine. Poland and the Baltic states. These D.P's could come and go as they liked, being classified as safe.

**Right** - 'displaced persons' at Enderby. By and large they got along very well with the villagers of Enderby and surrounding areas.

There was always the language barrier - but this seemed to get less and less as villagers took to them, invited them into their homes at Christmas and Easter. Several were to marry Enderby girls -



much to the chagrin of the village boys. One was Povilas Kurganovas who married Joan Buswell and remained a farm worker and fathered several children.

By the end of 1947 250,000 POWs had been repatriated home, but 24,000 decided to stay on in Britain. Mostly being in a relationship with a British woman or their original home was under Soviet control. There were at least 23 P.O.W. camps across Leicestershire and Rutland with Italian, German, Ukrainian and other eastern European prisoners where they were used in manual labour. Leicestershire had the largest amount of camps than any other county being middle England and landlocked.

There was also a camp for the Italians at Dunton Bassett. It was situated on Elwell's farm in Cooper's Lane. Unlike the dour Germans, the always cheerful and melodic Italian P.O.W's were wistfully welcomed by the Land Army Girls at Sharnford Shade farm.

Tuscany, Italy - including Ferdinando Laudati. The men were repatriated home by 1947 and

once back home Ferdinando married his sweetheart (Left)Teresa Strianese in 1949.

Dunton Bassett (to the rear of our photo). I photographed it in March 2021 - now on the verge of collapse due to the weight of vegetation and is now in a sad state. Coalesced under the area number 49 with other POW encampments - I recall passing Dunton Bassett's encampment many times when my family regularly motored past on the way to Uncle Cotes-de-Val. Frank's farm at Gilmorton. There was no POW's by



then - they all had been repatriated home - but I was still awe-stricken and perhaps a little afraid as a 4/5 year old.. The irony of it all was that the Dunton Bassett Italian P.O.W's used to service my Uncle Frank's farm.

#### HINCKLEY NATIONAL RAIL FREIGHT INTERCHANGE Deadline 1 Submission on Behalf of Sharnford Parish Council REP1-210

#### **Relevant Representation**

Sharnford is a small village in Blaby District 3 miles away from the HNRFI project. The village already experiences heavy traffic, due to its proximity to the A5, Magna Park at Lutterworth and the new DPD and Amazon facilities near M69 Junction 1.

At the Boundary with Leicester City lies Croft Quarry. This quarry is one of the largest excavated holes in Europe and is a major source of granite for the construction industry and, when it reaches the end of its mining life, it is expected to become a landfill site with vast quantities of London's waste as well as rubble from the HS2 rail line being dumped there. Most tipper lorries to and from this site travel through Sharnford, losing some of their load on the tight corners adjacent to the Bricklayers Public House. The proposed interchange will increase the amount of traffic in the area, not to mention the effect it will have on the environment!

This national infrastructure project will never use the proposed rail link due to the major constraints at Narborough Railway level crossing. The rail aspect is being used to circumvent normal local authority planning processes. The project is a method of constructing major warehousing in the countryside with all traffic travelling by road. Currently Sharnford, a small village adjacent to the major trunk road A5, has seen an increase in HGV traffic of over 500 thousand vehicle movements per year due to existing expansion of local warehousing developments. It is envisaged that the HNRFI will see all traffic through Sharnford double to over 7 million vehicle movements on the already overburdened B-road, causing major increases in pollution.

#### BACKGROUND

- 1. Sharnford, a village of 1100 residents, lies approximately 3 miles Southeast of the proposed HNRFI development
- The village is mainly residential but includes a small industrial estate straddling Aston Lane, comprising of a HGV transport company, a container hire company with storage facilities, a forklift hire company, and various SME's. In addition, there is a post office, garage and two pubs.
- 3. There is a Village Hall opposite the Bricklayers pub where the B4114 splits in two.
- 4. There is a play area with a Youth/Community Hall north of the B4114 on the Soar Broak that runs through the village, and a Recreation Ground immediately South of the B4114.
- 5. Sharnford CofE Primary School is on the Northern edge of the village.
- 6. There is no regular bus service and villagers rely on private cars to access Hinckley for many services.

- 7. The village straddles the B4114, which is a major HGV route from the A5 to Leicester and links to the B4669 towards Jn2 of the M69 (and the proposed HNRFi site).
- 8. Sharnford has suffered over many years with the increase in HGV traffic and was recommended for a bypass in the Leicestershire Local Transport Plan 2007. This did not take place due to financial constraints. Since then, traffic volume through the village has risen from just under 3 million vehicles per year to well over 3.5 million.
- After many appeals to Leicestershire County Council and news reports on BBC radio and television, Leicestershire County Council relented, and average speed cameras were installed. Speeds have reduced but traffic volumes continue to increase.
- 10. Refuges at the entrance to the village have also been put in to reduce speeding traffic.
- 11. At the B4669 end the B4114 passes residential estates before it narrows at the Church. The hill from the Church down towards the centre of the village is so narrow that two HGVs cannot pass each other without mounting the pavement. The properties along this section of road do not have off-street parking and must find alternative parking solutions.
- 12. The B4114 splits in the middle of the village into two one-way sections through residential areas and emerges to a short stretch before a second refuge indicates the end of the village, also with speed signs.
- 13. There are tight bends on both the one-way sections, most notably exactly at the Junction with Aston Road, where there is a warning to slow down.
- 14. Access to Sharnford can also be gained via Aston Lane, through Aston Flamville. There is a pinch point on Aston Lane close to the Junction due to a Grade 2 listed farm building where only one Lorry can enter the narrow section.
- 15. There is one pedestrian crossing on the B4114, close to the garage, which is used particularly by children going to school and has a patrol sign. The CofE school no longer take children to St Helens church because of the near misses on the pedestrian crossing and the narrowness of the pavement adjacent to the post office. There is also a sign for children crossing adjacent to Fox Hollies.
- 16. We consider it is already hazardous for pedestrians trying to access the only shop/post office in the village, especially as lorries must mount the narrow pavements on the B4114 to pass each other.
- 17. The junction of the B4114 with the A5, known locally as Smockington Hollow, has caused concerns over the number of accidents and fatalities. Crashmaps shows 4 (one serious) in the last five years, as well as a series of accidents along the B4114 between Sharnford and the Junction (up to 2021).
- 18. There have also been many crashes on the Aston Lane route, including the very tight bend just outside the village where vehicles have overturned or gone through hedges and fences into fields.

- 19. Sadly, there have also been two fatal cycling accidents at the junction of the B4669/B4114 since 2020. There are no dedicated cycling lanes so most local cycling is done on road. The bridleways are not generally suitable for cyclists.
- 20. Like many of the local villages Sharnford is linked into the extensive local Public Rights of Way network, notably the bridleway which extends towards the proposed HRNFI site and a bridleway to Sapcote. Villagers also enjoy their proximity to Burbage Common and are particularly concerned about threats to this amenity.

#### CONCERNS

- 21. We are concerned that the HNRFI proposals could have a cumulative effect of adding some 10,000+ vehicle movements per day onto rural roads.
- 22. Their premise is that traffic will use the M69 towards either M1 or M6 which ignores the current congestion at these junctions.
- We think the effect of M69 congestion and motorway closures will be to push vehicles, including HGVs, onto roads through Sapcote, Hinckley, Aston Flamville and Sharnford.
- 24. We note that at present the evidence does not include the 'emergency' plan if the M69 is not available and we cannot find any evidence on where HGVs would go in this 'worst-case' scenario.
- 25. As shown in the photos, the road through Aston Flamville (a conservation village) and Sharnford, are not suitable for high levels of traffic, especially HGVs.
- 26. The Transport Assessment (acknowledges that the B4114 is an undesirable route for lorries) and local people will continue to use the Sharnford Road cut-through





- 27. Not only that but as well as the development traffic which appears to be under-estimated, certainly not a worst-case scenario, the introduction of the slip roads as well as proposals for new housing around the Junction, facilitated by the slip road changes, will lead to worse traffic problems, including more HGVs through all the villages.
- 28. Knock on effects include pollution and noise, including night-time traffic to the site.
- 29. We are also concerned particularly about the impact on vulnerable users, pedestrians, cyclists and equestrians as well as access to amenities such as Burbage Common.

We consider all these findings are highly speculative and that the capacity constraints which already exist (and will only get worse) meaning that these benefits will never emerge. For these reasons we continue to oppose development of the HNRFi site and believe it should be refused permission.

#### No.10 Downing Street

On October 17th your District Councillors, together with Cllr Terry Richardson,

were invited by Alberto Costa MP to join him to present a petition against Hinckley National Rail Freight Interchange, at No.10 Downing Street. That evening Alberto Costa MP spoke on the petition in the House of Commons.

Your councilors and Member of Parliament will fight the HNRFI proposals at every opportunity, continuing with the Planning

Inspectorate examination on Monday 30<sup>th</sup> October through to Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> November. One or both of your district councilors will attend the seven separate hearings, raising any matters on the Scheme.

commented on our objections to two Hinckley & Bosworth Borough Council planning applications:

• Jelson Homes – 343 homes, either side of Aston Flamville Road. This refused application has now gone to the Planning Inspectorate under appeal. Cllr Shirley has requested to speak at the appeal in objection to the application.

• Lychgate Lane – 85 homes on Lychgate Lane which went to appeal have, unfortunately, been approved by the Planning Inspectorate.

#### Arsonists Destroy Nature Area Toilets

Councillor Nigel Grundy, Blaby District Council's portfolio holder for neighbourhood services and assets, said: "I'm at a loss to understand what pleasure anyone gets out of wilfully destroying facilities like these. "A mindless few spoiling it for the many." He said the toilets were installed after calls from visitors to have the facility about four years ago.

Cllr Grundy added: "Sadly, they have been a constant target for vandals, with attacks ranging from the small scale to this last incident, which has left just a puddle of plastic where the toilets used to stand."

Since their introduction by Blaby District Council around four years ago, the units have been subject to sporadic vandalism, requiring repair and replacement at a cost of between  $\pounds 2,000$  to  $\pounds 3,000$  each time. A Leicestershire Police spokesman said no arrests had yet been made, and anyone with any information has been urged to contact the force.

# DOG FOULING/WASTE

We published a similar article a couple of years ago and feel duty bound to highlight the issue once more. Over the last few months it has become more evident of an increase in dog fouling around the village.

Within our little village we are blessed with two parks and we are located next to Fosse Meadows, these are all utilised by all villagers including children. They should not have to avoid dog waste whilst using these facilities.

The local council are always looking to invest/improve the facilities of the local parks, but it would be a shame if the parks were a "no go zone" due to dog waste deeming these investments a complete waste of time and money. It's also not limited to the parks as evidence can be found in streets and footpaths.

• Don't forget that leaving dog mess behind is actually illegal, and dog owners can be prosecuted and fined for doing so. If you spot somebody leaving dog mess behind when out on a walk, particularly if they do this regularly, this can be reported to the local council.

• Don't forget dog waste is harmful to the health of both people and the land that it pollutes, as well as posing an eyesore, and potentially causing further mess, unpleasantness and inconvenience if stepped in or tracked about, particularly if it is unwittingly walked back into the home/school/local business.

• Don't forget that dog mess can carry parasites and diseases such as toxicariasis, and always wash your hands thoroughly after dealing with dog waste; even if you do not physically touch it with your bare hands.

Please can we ask dog owners to help keep our village clean and utilise the provided dog waste bins.

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#### SHARNFORD PARISH COUNCIL

This is my first report since taking over as Chairman of Sharnford Parish from Mike Shirley in May, and four years since my previous time in the Chair. The changes in those last four years have been remarkable, with new councillors and clerk, experiencing a higher workload and responsibilities, especially the clerk.



We have taken over maintenance of grass verges and hedges from Leicestershire County Council, increasing the number of cuts to vastly improve the look of the village.

Resident's Christmas lights in the village have brightened up

the dull winter lights and we hope to see even more this year, with the Parish Council lighting up the tree next to the Sharnford Evergreen Hall. Hopefully the competition for best lights and dressed window will continue with cash prizes.

The cemetery on Mill Lane has been due for a makeover and, as I am writing this, the work

is ending. It has been a costly venture, but the improvements should help with maintenance over the coming years. The next job is to replace the heavy wooden gates, which have seen better days, with wrought iron ones. We are currently reviewing quotes for the work to be carried out as soon as possible.

You cannot have missed the proposal for a National Rail Freight Interchange sandwiched between the M69 motorway and the Leicester to Nuneaton rail line. The parish council, together with Sapcote, employed a consultant on your behalf to challenge the proposal and produce a report. We now feel that we have enough knowledge and experience to continue with any further objections on our own, at a considerable cost saving.

We have continued to keep a watching brief,



together with a concerned resident who has taken the lead, on the amount of sewage being allowed into the river by Severn Trent Water with the full knowledge of the Environment Agency.


