DAY OF THE FLOOD

The 2nd of January 2024, another day to remember for Sharnford suffering the effects of flooding.

But before I go into detail, I would like to thank all those volunteers who helped out diverting and dissuading motorists away from the floods where possible. As things were at full stretch and without people pitching in, I'm sure things would have been absolute turmoil. Thank you all again for your efforts at the height of evening rush hour through Sharnford.

As a flood warden I have very few powers and the main road and Aston Lane needed closing. Despite this there were a few idiots that braved the flood waters at their own risk. Quite a few came to grief and had to be rescued. (*Picture on the right courtesy of Sharnford parish council*)

Long before the flood waters closed the centre of Sharnford I was already in



action mid-afternoon dealing with flood water in gardens, some a foot deep, which was in danger of actually getting into properties, most of this was caused by run-off from the already sodden fields. If I didn't come to your aid, it's important to remember that I'm an unpaid volunteer as one of your village flood wardens and we could only spread our help and advice to a limited number of people.

I'm sure in the future there will be further risk of properties being flooded, it is in your own interests to get flood prevention equipment and deploy it at times of flood. Help and information is available from Blaby District Council., whose resources were fully stretched this time around.

My day connected with floods started around 2:30 in the afternoon and I didn't finish until around 11:00 o'clock at night. I was grateful to the people who were unaffected by the floods provide hot drinks, etc. to the volunteers, who we would have been lost without. (Picture on the right submitted to Facebook).



Further work was required in the early hours of the morning as the flood waters had receded. Being unable to sleep I was out and about around 4:00 in the morning checking the condition of the roads affected by floods and redeploying traffic signs where needed and generally clearing debris and rubbish left behind by the flood,

before the morning rush hour began although this was somewhat muted because of the widespread disruption caused by the floods.

Again, volunteers and members of the Parish rallied round to clear up rubbish and debris which covered a wide area centred on the Bricklayers.

I checked on most of the properties affected by the ingress of flood water to see what help we could give them if they needed it.

Councillor Nigel Grundy, Blaby District Council Portfolio Holder for Neighbourhood Services and Assets, said: "Storm Henk was just overwhelming so we really want to be supporting our residents at this challenging time. We hope our work and that of our partner agencies is going some way to help ease the burden of the aftermath."

HIGHCROSS DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

Our report starts with the continued examination of the Hinckley National Rail Freight Interchange (HNRFI) by the Planning Inspectorate. The examination comes to an end on 12th March 2024. The inspector and his team will then take three months


to review all of the evidence put before them by the applicant Tritax, and councils. from parish councils up to county councils. In addition, there will be evidence submitted by National Highways and although National Rail. National Rail could not be



bothered to turn up at the last open meeting, much to the annoyance of the planning inspector.

Once the inspectorate have completed their review they will make a recommendation to the Secretary of State for Transport. The Secretary of State will then take up until mid September 2024 to make a final decision on whether the application should be approved or refused.

Hinckley & Bosworth Planning Application 22/01037/OUT - Erection of 343 homes, Jelson Homes, Aston Flamville Road, Burbage This application was refused

by H&BBC and a new application submitted in August 2023. Jelson Homes have now appealed to the Planning Inspectorate for the first application. In tandem with this application, a new proposal was presented to H&BBC Planning Committee (23/00673/OUT) on 13th February, where Cllr Mike Shirley spoke in objection.

Unfortunately, the planning committee voted in favour of officer's recommendation to approve the application, 8 members voted to approve, none voted against, and 9 voted to abstain. The map shows the development marked in yellow, either side of

Aston Flamville Road and new housing development on Lychgate Lane, adjacent to the proposed solar panel farm either side of Lychgate Lane marked in blue.

OUR SOLAR JOURNEY

For this article we thought we would share our experiences of using solar power to provide electricity to our house. It started about 3 years ago we decided to experiment with solar power that could generate power in our shed.

Being a complete novice in this area, I purchased 3 x 120watts solar panels and a small battery and invertor (converts the DC solar to AC power giving you a standard plug to use for an appliance). This allowed us to charge and provide free power to a lawn mower battery, power lighting and a garden pond pump (not all together!!). We initially spent around £700 for this small system....this proved a success.

In September 2022 we started to consider an installation for the house, following all the uncertainty of energy price hikes and also could we do a little something that would benefit the planet that we are all responsible for

To help with our decision making we started to understand what power was being



used in the house. The below chart gives some rough estimates of popular appliances in the household. The wattage amount is given for an hour of usage, clearly a kettle is not on for an hour it's between 30seconds to 1 minute.

The figures shown for a fridge and a freezer are for a total day, as these are appliances that are normally on all the time. If you look at a dishwasher this will not be using 1500w for

whole cycle it will fluctuate. (Left: The wattage shown on a hair dryer)

1000watts = 1KW , **Note**: TVs, Computers, and other devices left on standby still draw some power.

We examined our usage through past billing and obtained a number of quotes. On average throughout the year we were using around 9KW of power each day

In December 2022 we finally opted for the following specification:-


This equipment allowed us (if the sun was fully shining at the correct angle) to fully charge our storage in an hour and half. Clearly this does not take into account appliances that you will have running and also we live in the UK so the there are days when the sun does not shine. However if the battery was fully charged it could run a microwave for over 8 hours or the have the electric oven running at full power for 4 hours for example..

On the 26th January 2023 our system went live and so at the time of writing this report on the 31st January 2024 we have now been live for just over a year. The

following chart shows how much electricity our system has generated. As expected June (longest daylight month) generated the most, being nearly 900KW of power. What is also interesting April generated about the same as August.



The positioning of our house does help with the roof being in a south east position. With the sun rising in the east and then setting in the west, but the angle of the sun does also change during the year (June being the highest in the sky month). This is something to consider if purchasing solar panels.

The table below details further information about our usage. This was taken on the 31st January so after one year the system generated the following amount of electricity (6.13MWh) that's 6013KW equaling to 715 full (8.2KW) batteries or running the vacuum for over 6000 hours!!

In our conclusions we have shown how much power I have generated along with what that equals to in money terms (at 30p per KW). Prices and tariffs have fluctuated in my first full year, however what is also not captured in this report is on my tariff we

have the ability to feed back into the grid, thus generating money back. So when our battery is full and the solar is directly powering your house consumption it will feed back into the grid.

Look at the image below. This shows at the time it was taken the solar panels are generating 986watts. Our current consumption in the house is 285watts, so the rest of the generated power is going to

the battery. The battery is now 43% full.

The image to the right shows the battery now full, so the generated power is feeding the house consumption and the rest feeding back into the national grid

We are happy with the system and from our initial outlay of £14,500 we are on target within 8 years to recoup the money (could be sooner), but



already helping our environment. The system is intelligent enough to firstly use the solar input, if there is no solar input it will go to the battery, then if you have no stored power it will use the grid at your current tariff rate.

One change we would make is the 3.0 AC GiVenergy, as this gives you a maximum draw from the battery at 3KW (battery will be used when insufficient Solar is not present). So if you put a number of appliances on at the same time that would total over 3KW/3000W then it will draw from the grid (even if you have more in the battery), increasing this slightly would prevent this. We may also in the future consider adding a further battery to store more power, especially for the winter months where we have a need to utilise the grid more.

SHARNFORD HISTORY Thoughtful Spot......

Peaceful and yet largely forgotten - to the rear of St. Helen's church, is a collection of twenty small slate tablets and cast iron memorial markers mostly leaning against the building, each containing only the briefest of inscriptions (example C.H. 1847).

With dates ranging from 1810 to 1898, these were often thought to be the markers of children; but this was proved to be not the case. I was fortunate to be able to unravel these unnamed markers and put names to



them; for it is only fitting that they should not be forgotten. Four of the markers contain a full name so I have omitted them from my listing.

Have you ever wondered why there is a wall or animal proof fence around the perimeter of churches? An old saying used to say that it was to keep its inhabitants from getting out, or perhaps thought to keep stray animals out of the graveyard?. Not so – it was to keep animals <u>inside</u>. It was fashionable to keep a couple of cows or a small flock of sheep in the graveyard to keep the grass down. These were the days long before the motorised grass mower.

It is always a tragedy when a young person dies - especially a teenager. Below I have chronicled briefly the short life of the youngest of the above- 19 year old Elizabeth Saunt.

Elizabeth Saunt was born in Sharnford in 1866, the 2nd child of four. Her parents

were Aaron and Elizabeth Saunt nee Whitmill. Father Aaron Saunt- a waggoner & labourer - was also born in Sharnford in 1847. The Saunt's were quite an old Sharnford family whom I can trace back in a continuous line to a wedding in 1736 at St. Helen's church.

Elizabeth's mother died in 1877 (age 34) — her uncle Thomas — a wheelwright & carpenter — died aged 39 (see list above). In April 1881 Elizabeth was a 15 yr. old domestic servant at Abbey Farm, Wolvey. Elizabeth died 5th July and was buried at St. Helen's church 8th July 1885. The cause of death was pneumonia, phthisis pulmonalis (tuberculosis) and dropsy (water retention) of feet and legs. Present at her death was her sister Hannah Saunt.

THE OLD SCHOOL SURGERY STONEY STANTON PATIENT PARTICIPATION GROUP

The Patients Participation Group (PPG) reformed again last year after COVID and with new volunteers. The

primary purpose of PPG is to represent the views and experiences of ALL member patients at the surgery. This is to help the surgery be proactive in providing services that reflect the requirements of the patients. Our mission is to aid communications between the GP Surgery and Patients.

To date the PPG have conducted a patient's survey and assisted with the COVID vaccination weekends (car parking and surveys). Attended Integrated Care Board information days, looked at patients' areas of concerns and how we might assist in communicating changes. We are in the process of suggesting improvements to the website and looking at producing quarterly information articles.

The NHS and GP Surgeries have experienced significant changes since COVID and The Old School Surgery is no different. They are supporting approx. 8,000 patients primarily in the villages of Elmesthorpe, Sapcote, Sharnford, Stoney Stanton and Thurlaston. During a typical month they can deal with more than 6,000 telephone calls.

More face-to-face appointments are being requested by patients and were added in January 2024. The PPG encourage all patients to embrace the changes where possible, by using online services to book appointments and order prescriptions.


the side of the cove. None of use fancied a dive, so we moved on to Stoney Stanton.

SHARNFORD PARISH COUNCIL

Rain and high winds have marked the last three months culminating in a devastating flood and the collapse of the cemetery gates.

The cemetery gates will be replaced soon but the rain keeps coming and Sharnford will need help to prepare for any more potential floods. Leicestershire County Council need to keep the drains clear of blockages and Severn Trent Water need to increase the capacity of our drainage system, both storm water and sewage.

Residents need to prepare for future events and not to rely on councils, who are limited in what help they can give. We live in the countryside so most of the flood water is run-off from our neighbouring fields. If you are responsible for fields and paddocks,

please make sure that your ditches and gullies are clear of debris. We shouldn't expect properties in Henson Way and Halls Crescent to be subjected to flooding.

The photograph to the right shows the river and footpath under water, this also includes Poors Meadow. DO NOT LET CHILDREN OR DOGS GO IN THE WATER. Despite notices being posted on the gates and Facebook people are still allowing their dogs and children to play in the water, it is full of human excrement from the sewage pumping station which,



despite the assurances of Severn Trent Water, is not fit for purpose and discharging into the river at the slightest drop of rain. The Environment Agency are aware of this but appear to be powerless to action any penalties on Severn Trent.

The wooden cemetery gates have only lasted 13 years but have now succumbed to wind and rot. The new gates will be wrought iron and should last for many years to come; however, they will cost more than £5000. Luckily the parish council have been

saving for this eventuality for many years.

In June the Sharnford Golden Jubilee Committee will be holding our annual fete. As part of the celebrations will be the presentation of the Jubilee Cup. The cup is presented each year to an individual or group who has made a significant contribution to the village and is a resident of the Parish. The closing date for nominations is Thursday 16th

May. Sealed nominations can be given to any parish councillor or the clerk, or alternatively, you can present your nomination at the Parish Council meeting on that night.

Over the last three months there have been a number of planning applications in Sharnford, mainly home extensions, but the latest applications are of some note:

20/1461/FUL – Change of use of agricultural land to residential use. Bumble Bee Lane. This application is to build a home in a field which was applied for in 2021. It has now reappeared as a live application.

24/0090/FUL – Erection of 3 four-bedroom houses and 3 five-bedroom houses including the demolition of The Gables, Chapel Lane. This is a new application which is receiving a lot of criticism from neighbouring residents.

Both applications will be decided either by Blaby District Council Planning Committee or an officer from Blaby Planning Department.

Residents and public are welcome to attend the parish council meeting, held on the third Thursday of every month (excluding August) in the Sharnford Evergreen Hall at 7.30pm.
